

Larkin Is Remanded Again On Charge Of Joyriding

A further remand until Monday, August 31st, was given to Ralph Tweedy Larkin of Charlottetown charged in City Police Court with taking a motor vehicle (joyriding) without the consent of the owner.

Three witnesses for the prosecution were heard by Acting Magistrate Allison Gillis, this morning. The first Albert Steele an employee of Goodspeed Motors, Charlottetown, stated that he had noticed the car a 1955 two-tone Chevrolet sedan was missing from its parking space in front of Goodspeed's, at about supper time on August 26th.

He testified that he questioned the company salesman who all stated that they had not given permission to any person to take the car. Steele also stated that he had observed the accused and his brother earlier in the day looking over another car and he had learned later that they had told one of the salesmen they were interested in buying a car.

Cst. J.O. Murray, R.C.M.P., testified that at about 5.35 on

August 26th, a call had been received at the R.C.M.P. headquarters that a car, a 1955 black and white Chevrolet sedan was missing from Goodspeed Motors.

At about 8.45 that evening a car of the description given was stopped on the Trans-Canada Highway in the Southport district. Witness said that the accused was at the wheel and there were five other persons in the vehicle.

The accused was taken to the R.C.M.P. headquarters for questioning, he said that Larkin had first told them, the police, that he had been given permission by a Mr. Myers to take the car. Cst. Murray stated that later the accused had changed his story and admitted that he and a juvenile had taken the car without permission.

The third witness Cst. R.E. Williams, R.C.M.P., corroborated the evidence given by Cst. Murray, and added that at the time the accused was stopped on the highway, he, the witness, had observed that there was no ignition

key in the switch. Questioned by the magistrate, Cst. Williams stated that this car model could be started without the aid of a key.

Counsel for the defence is F.A. Large, Q.C., while the prosecution is being conducted by Chief of Police C.W. MacArthur.

Test Indicates Fluoride Works

TORONTO (CP) — An experiment among pre-school children in Toronto's Riverdale district has indicated cavities in teeth are decreased when a solution of tin fluoride is painted on them.

The experiment is described in a report published in the current issue of the Canadian Dental Association Journal. The year-long study involved two groups of about 100 children.

The children with their teeth painted with the fluoride had 28 per cent fewer cavities.

Dr. F.H. Compton, who worked on the experiment, said today that in the absence of water fluoridation the tin fluoride technique could be valuable to persons in other age groups.

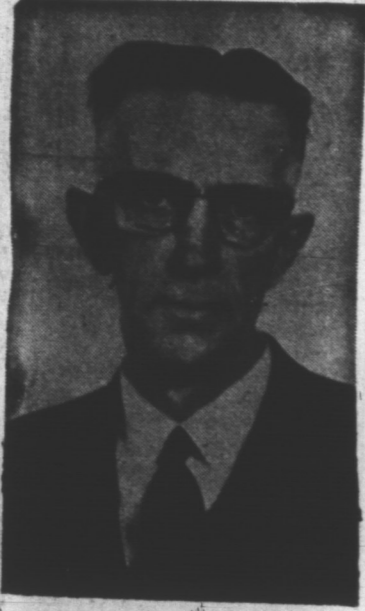
