Miscouche Fire Fund Appeals For Support

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — The Miscouche Firemen's Club met in the studio of CIRW Sunday afternoon in connection with a fund drive for a Miscouche family which was burned out in an early morning flash fire on Nov. 7.

Already \$700 in cash donations have been realized since the fund was begun by the Miscouche club and it was felt that residents of Summerside should be given an opportunity to aid this worthy cause.

Friends and neighbors of the family are in the process of repairing the home which was completely gutted, and furnishings and clothing are being donated by Miscouche residents.

It was mentioned that any furniture left over after the home was being refurbished will be auctioned off later with the proceeds going into the fund for the rehabilitation of the family.

Some of the donations already received were from the St. Thomas Aquinas and Assumption societies of Summerside, Miscouche Youth Club. Approximately \$120 was realized in a card party staged by the Miscouche Firemen's Club last week.

One Summerside pharmacy, Waites, has offered drugs for a year at cost price and has also offered to donate other medicines towards the recuperation of the burned victims.

It was noted that the eldest son who was injured in the fire will probably be unable to work for six months due to injuries received.
