

Montreal Canadiens Take Two-Game Lead Over Regina Pats In Cup Finals

MONTREAL, April 30 — (CP) — A four-goal rally in the third period gave Montreal Canadiens a 5-2 victory over Regina Pats here Saturday night as the Eastern Canada champions took a two-game lead in the best-of-seven Memorial Cup final series.

A crowd of 10,000 saw the flashy Montrealers go all-out in the third period and rap four markers past goalie Bob Tyler in the last half of the stanza.

Canadiens held a wide margin in play throughout, but were unable to beat Tyler until the final session. Their heavy artillery pitted 27 shots as against 18 on little Roger Morrisette.

Shifty Billy Gould was the hero of the night. He wiped out Regina's one goal lead in the third period and went on to score the clinching marker. Art Ross fired the winning goal while Jacques Nadon and defenceman Ernie Roche accounted for the others.

Gordie Cowan sniped Pats' first goal midway through the first period and captain Morely MacNeil moved the Western champions into the lead with the only second period tally.

Local Boxer Loses Decision

HALIFAX, April 30 — (CP) — A last-minute substitute, Keith Paris, 152 1-2, of New Glasgow, N.S., scored a two-round knockout upset over Harold (Red) Graham of Halifax in the six-round semifinal to the George Ross-Roy Wouters Canadian middleweight title match here Saturday night.

Paris was springing for Blayne Hayden of Springhill, N.S., suspended for six months by the Halifax Athletic Commission for breach of contract. The K.O. came at 36 seconds of the second round after Paris had hurt Graham badly in the first round.

Dexter Connors, 129 1-2, of Truro, N.S., and Jim McKenzie, 129, of Halifax drew in a four-round slugfest that drew wild approval from the crowd. Paddy McNeil, 140, of Glace Bay, N.S., won a split decision from K. O. Steele, 141, of Charlottetown, in a tame four-round curtain raiser.

Blistering Pace

Throughout the teams set a blistering pace in a game that was scarred with 20 penalties, Regina receiving 12.

A third period tripping penalty to defenceman Al King in a large way was responsible for the Montreal victory. He was sitting out his minor when Rose shifted through the weakened Pats to slide in the winning goal.

Dickie Moore, who turned in a stellar performance in the first game of the series, was closely checked all night and was held to an assist on his team's first goal. This caused him to display his feelings which netted him five trips to the penalty box including one major thumb off for roughing.

Third game of the series will be played at Toronto Tuesday night with the fourth back at Montreal Thursday.

Cards Defeat Chicago 1-0 In Pitching Duel

Del Rice Sunday broke up a brilliant 13-inning pitching duel with a home run to give St. Louis Cardinals a 1-0 National League victory over Chicago Cubs. Harry Brecheen and Johnny Schmitz fought the mound battle.

Rice was the only Cardinal to reach base after the sixth. The Cubs got Wayne Terwilliger to third in the top of the 12th and Andy Pafko was on first when Brecheen struck out Roy Smalley to work out his only real trouble of the contest.

Brecheen gave five hits, struck out eight and walked one in his 13 innings.

Schmitz allowed four hits, walked two and struck out two.

At Philadelphia, Robin Roberts struck out 11 Boston Braves to lead Philadelphia Phils to a 9-3 triumph in the second game of a doubleheader after Boston's rookie pitcher Norman Roy limited Phils to five hits, one a homer, to cap the opener, 4-1.

There were five homers in the twin bill, three by the Phils.

Russ Meyer, pitcher for the Phils, was ejected from the field and barred from the twin bill when he argued with umpire Al Barlick in the third inning of the first game. The umpire called Earl Torgerson safe on a close play at first on which Meyer covered the bag.

In the opener Sam Jethroe sparked Boston to their triumph. Jethroe tripled in the third and scored the first run, hit a homer in the fifth for the second and drove in the fourth tally in the ninth with a single.

Ron Northey powered a two-run homer in the seventh to hand Cincinnati Reds a 2-1 win over Pittsburgh Pirates and enable them to sweep both ends of a doubleheader. Northey's home run was the first hit off pitcher Mel Queen.

Cincinnati won the first game 6-2 to make it three straight over Pittsburgh in their series and run their winning streak to four for the first time since 1948.

The Brooklyn at New York game was rained out.

Roy Wouters Captures Canadian Middleweight Title From George Ross

HALIFAX, April 30 — (CP) — Determined and methodical Roy Wouters of Vancouver, a 5-6 underdog, ended George Ross' 20-month reign as Canadian middleweight boxing king here Saturday night by hammering the former West Bay Road N.S. farm boy into submission in the ninth round of their 12-round championship battle.

Some 4,500 fans were both stilled and disappointed when it was announced just before the start of the 10th that Ross was unable to continue. Wouters, who scored 158 to Ross' 156 3-4, was declared winner by a ninth round technical knockout.

Promoter Gussie MacLellan of Glace Bay, N.S., also Ross' manager, said a re-match would be held in a Nova Scotia ring within the next three months. Wouters' contract stipulated that if he won Ross got first crack at the title within six months. Both will be allowed tune-up fights.

Taking full command from the third round Wouters gave Ross the worst beating of his career with a dazzling, dynamiting two-fisted attack. Ross only decked once previously, was floored twice — once in the seventh round, for a nine-count and in the ninth for no-count. Wouters didn't land as many punches as Ross in the early rounds but he always hit harder.

Ross Exhausted
At the end neither fighter was out. But Ross was exhausted and both his eyes and face were puffed and bruised. His left eye particularly showed the effects of the punches he took from Wouters' stiff, punishing left hooks and rocking straight rights in close defence, suffered his first loss in 37 professional fights in Canada and the United States. It was his first appearance in five months following a disastrous two-month British campaign, last fall. He lost two fights to leading British middleweights and had to lay off to heal an injured left eyebrow.

The win was the highlight of Wouters' four-year career and his 48th in 64 bouts. The tall, built, wavy-haired Western Canadian champion made Rene Chauvin, his veteran Montreal hander, happy. Before the match the excited and shrewd Chauvin, who piloted Danny Webb to the Canadian welterweight championship, told reporters he was sure he had another champion in the 25-year-old Wouters.

In his dressing room, Ross said he wanted to continue but Al Clement, his handler, urged him to quit.

"Al said I was in bad shape and couldn't win except by a knockout so what was the use of taking a chance of being seriously hurt," explained the 26-year-old Koss.

The end started in the fourth when Wouters' caught Ross with a solid left hook to the head and Ross walked back to his corner with a hurt look. Tiring as he was, Ross was rocked again in the fifth and almost doubled up from a left chop to the stomach. In the sixth another flurry to the mouth made Ross groggy and he was spitting blood at the end of the round.

Red Sox Pound Out Twin Victories Over Philadelphia Athletics

Boston Red Sox Sunday pounded out 10-0 and 6-5 victories as they extended their Fenway Park winning streak over Philadelphia Athletics to 14 straight in the American League doubleheader.

Ted Williams, who missed seven of the last eight games, clouted a pair of three-run homers in the opener, during which Junior Stephens and Bobby Doerr lashed circuit drives.

The Sox, who saw nothing resembling major-league pitching in the first game until lefty Bob Shantz became the fourth Athletics hurler in the fourth, banged out a total of 17 hits for 34 bases. The victims of that terrific onslaught were starter Dick Fowler, the loser, Harry Byrd and Joe Coleman.

Given a seven-run lead after the first two frames, Joe Dobson put together an easy five-hit shutout. The Sox, however, did not reach their slugging peak until the fourth, when 15 of them went to bat and registered 11 runs.

Boston built up a 5-0 lead on bonus southpaw Chuck Stobbs during the first three innings of the nightcap, but he weakened gradually and the A's had the tying run on first with none out in the ninth when Al Papi came in and saved the game by retiring the last three A's in order.

Chicago White Sox overcame a 7-0 deficit to gain a 7-7 tie in the second game of doubleheader against Detroit Tigers, after winning the opener 5-0 behind lefty Bill Wight's two-hit pitching before 8,175 shivering Chicago fans.

Darkness forced an end to the second game. That deadlock enabled Detroit to retain undisputed possession of first place with a half-game built up over New York Yankees.

Detroit built up its 7-0 edge during the first six innings against starter Mickey Haefner and Ken Hoenes, third of five Chicago pitchers. During this span Virgil Trucks limited White Sox to five hits.

The first of two home runs by Hank Majeski was good for three of Chicago's four runs in the seventh as Trucks left in favor of Hal White.

Bob Cain and Randy Gumpert, meanwhile, held Detroit rudderless during the final three innings before Chicago pounded across three runs for a tie-producing stand-off in the ninth.

A doubleheader between St. Louis and Cleveland was rained out along with a New York-Washington game.
