HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says fine weather and reasonable temperatures, mostly in the 70s, are forecast for all parts of the district today.

Northern Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Eastern N.B. Counties, Lower St. John River Valley: Clear, with a few cloudy intervals; light change in temperature; light winds. Low-high at New Glasgow and Charlottetown 55 and 70, Moncton 55 and 75, Fredericton and Saint John 52 and 75.

POTATO BOARD A SIGNATORY

Stresses Importance Of Holding Agreed Charges

Cancellation or even temporary suspension of the Agreed Charges under which Canada's railroads transport P. E. I. potatoes to Central Canadian points would result in a substantial "out-of-pocket" loss to Island producers.

This stern warning was delivered to the potato growers at Prince of Wales Wednesday night by Howard Mann, secretary of the Maritime Transportation Commission, who made a special trip from Moncton in order to speak to the assembly.

LEGAL CONTRACT He pointed out to the growers that the Agreed Charges existed in the form of a legal contract which could not be broken or altered without mutual consent.

This would mean that the Island would again be split into two zones so far as freight rates were concerned with the Montreal rate jumping to 56 cents in the outer zone and 54 cents in the inner.

3-CENT JUMP The transportation expert admitted that it was likely that a new Agreed Charge would eventually be written, but forecast that such new rates would be at least three cents per hundred-weight higher.

Mr. Mann was introduced by S. C. Wright, deputy-minister of Agriculture, and thanked by the chairman of the meeting, Mr. J. Lincoln Dewar.

Civil Servants Supported In Current Word Warfare

OTTAWA (CP)—The intermittent word warfare between some Commons members and the civil service took a turn in favor of the civil service side Thursday on general fronts.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker told a reporter that "no consideration whatsoever has been given" to the possibility of having a royal commission investigation of those who work for the government.

Stanley Knowles, former deputy CCF leader who now is a vice-president of the Canadian Labor Congress, said the government should crack down on Commons back-benchers who make irresponsible charges against civil servants.

"Sniping at civil servants may be a pleasant indoor sport for those who have nothing else to do," Mr. Knowles said in a statement.

Construction of the new runway at the Charlottetown Airport is to get underway almost immediately, according to indications yesterday.

The contract, valued at almost one million dollars, calls for the construction of a 7,000 foot runway, 200 feet wide, to be completed by October 1959.

In addition to the above contract, additional ones will be awarded for the replacement of the approach lighting, \$50,000;

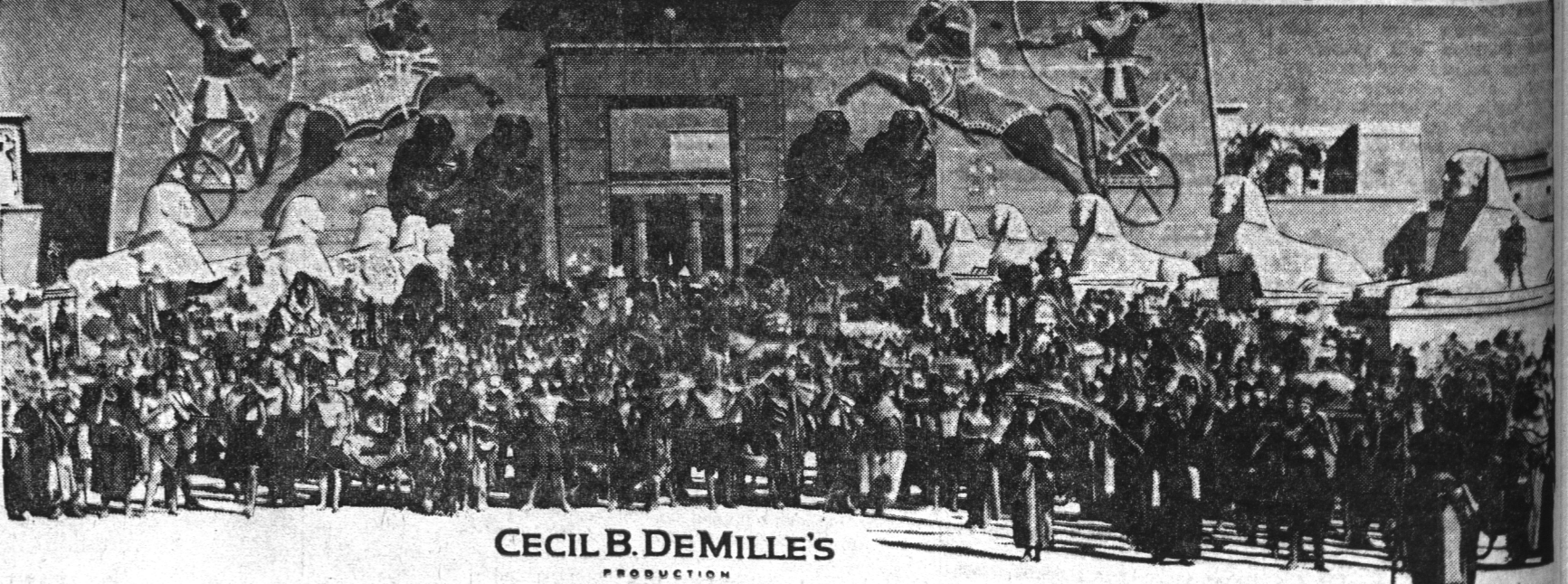
