It also describes what I found many (far too many) students here do not possess. Students walk into my office with questions like "What can I do with a B.A. with a major in English?" Well, my answer would be the same to any of the other degrees asking the same question - - anything you want! Now I know you can find me oodles of arguments to show me that it's not that easy. I'm going to tell you about the project which will shoot these less positive comments down.

Last summer I was approached by a faculty member to see what sort of involvement the Canada Manpower Centre on Campus could have in a new project called Small Business Internship Program. In brief, the intent of the program was to have small businesses hire recent graduates and in exchange for the possible lack of experience of these new grads, there would be a substantial wage reimbursement to the employer. Now that was the intent of Industry, Trade and Commerce, the sponsoring department. This wise professor had something else he wanted to prove. He wanted to show that University grads had a lot to contribute to small businesses to really assist them. And that U.P.E.I. students were FLEXIBLE. The results? Of the twenty-six placements made on P.E.I., we have two B.B.A.'s managing a motel operation, a B.A. major in psychology managing a new restaurant, a philosophy major as a Quality Control Manager, a biology major as Customer Service Manager for an engineering company, a B.Ed. as an Economic Consultant Trainee.

The main difference between these people and you people is that at the time they were UNEMPLOYED and not feeling very optimistic. So, they became FLEXIBLE - they had to and it paid off.

The labour market is restrictive enough in terms of what it has to offer you - it's up to you to use your talents to make yourself fit. And you can.
