It appears that some persons who occupied the house previous to Mr. Carr stuffed a stovepipe hole with rags and covered it with wall paper. This morning a spark set fire to the rags in the chimney. They burned so quickly that the inmates had to escape without attempting to save anything. The burning rags fell into a quantity of clothing packed in a box which stood close to the chimney. These clothes—the whole wearing apparel of the family—burned freely and were totally destroyed. Water buckets were brought into requisition and the fire was extinguished with utter serious damage to the house. Both steam fire engines were on way to the scene of the fire, but were ordered back by the Chief Engineer. THE gymnasium in the basement of the Young Men's Christian building has been re-opened.
