

Beecher on Home Rule.

Henry Ward Beecher returned from his trip to the Old Country last week. Shortly after his arrival in New York he was waited upon by the ubiquitous interviewer. Speaking of Ireland and Home Rule, Mr. Beecher said:—"My convictions as to what Ireland ought to have are not changed in any essential respect by my visit. While I was there I heard a great deal about Ireland, and I visited some portions of the country. I believe I will obtain Home Rule and she ought to have it. I mean by that a Government that shall resemble that of our State Governments. I do not think she ought to be separated from the Mother Country. Any dismemberment of Ireland from her relations to the Imperial Government I would resist with as much fervor and determination as I resisted the secession of South Carolina. I think, however, that this principle of local government will be just as eagerly sought for by the English, Scotch and Welsh people as it has been by the Irish; and while the Irishmen may get it first, the other portions of the family of Great Britain will not be without the same privileges very long. The British people expect to obtain manhood suffrage very soon, and this, with the disestablishment of the Church of England, will bring about great social and political changes."

A Drunkard's Fate.

The wife of John Jones, a workman in Harris' rolling mill, St. John, N. B., met with a tragic fate on the 16th inst. She was in the habit of indulging in almost daily sprees. On the 16th she was on a bigger drunk than usual. Her daughter, before going to work in the afternoon, in order to prevent her mother from obtaining more liquor, locked the door. The woman got out through a window and about half-past two was seen returning the same way, almost helplessly drunk. Half an hour later smoke was noticed issuing from her rooms and a man named Logan burst in the door and was horrified to see the naked body of the woman on the floor her flesh charred and shrivelled by the flames, which had emanated to the wood-work of the room. She then appeared to be living. He threw a bucket of water on the flames and called for help. As he did so the vital spark fled. It is thought that the unfortunate woman attempted to light a fire in the stove by all of paraffin, that the oil had fallen on her clothes and ignited, and that she was too intoxicated to know what to do. The chair on which she had been sitting was burned, as had the window sash and curtains.
