CALL.—The congregation of Springside, Upper Stewiacke, N. S., vacant since the death of the lamented Mr. Meek, has called Rev. S. C. Gunn, of East St. Peter's, P. E. Island. At a meeting of Truro Presbytery on Tuesday last the call was sustained and forwarded to the Presbytery of P. E. Island to be dealt with in the usual manner. Hon. S. Creelman appeared as Commissioner from Springside congregation and represented the call as hearty and unanimous. Rev. Mr. McMillan, of Princeton, was appointed to represent Truro Presbytery and the congregation of Springside before the Presbytery of P. E. Island.
