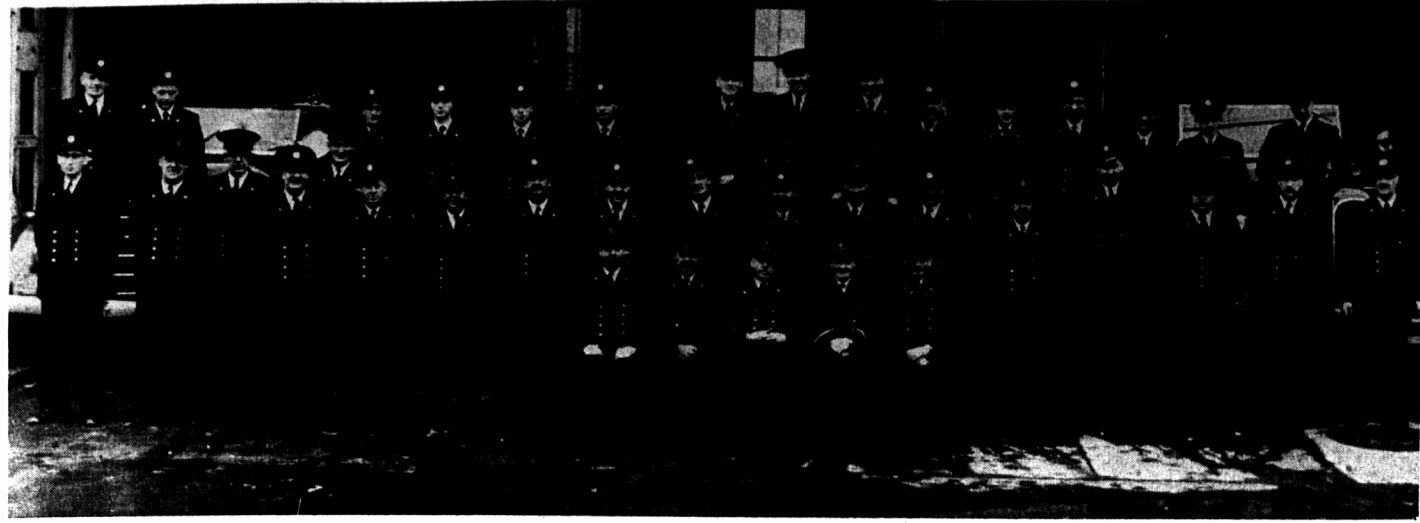

### Mr. Shaw Comments On Potato Prices

OTTAWA (CP) - A drop of 17,000,000 bushels in Canada's potato crop this year has resulted in a higher price return to the farmers, an agricultural expert said Monday. Mr. E. Shaw of Charlottetown, president of the Canadian Horticultural Council, said in a statement here that as a result of the smaller crop, about 50,000,000 bushels, the wholesale price in Montreal of four to five cents a pound is about double what it was last year. The former Deputy Agriculture Minister of Prince Edward Island is attending a meeting of the horticultural council here.

### Chemical May End Lawn Mowing

BINGLEY, England, (AP) - A British scientist reported Monday a new chemical has been developed which may make the chore of lawn mowing a thing of the past. The chemical slows the growing rate of grass from between 12 and 18 inches a year to as little as two inches, said John R. Escritt, chief research chemist at the Sports Turf Research Institute. But Escritt told a reporter the chemical has certain disadvantages: (1) It gives the weeds a chance to thrive, although these can be controlled with chemical weedkillers, and (2) in inexperienced hands, it may discolor the grass. "For these reasons it will be sold for the present only to expert gardeners such as park superintendents and golf course greenkeepers who can be taught how to use it."

### Eisenhower Asks Senate To Ratify New Agreements

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Eisenhower has called on the Senate to ratify the treaty binding a sovereign Germany closer to Western defence as a boon to "peace and freedom in the world as a whole." The president Monday sent to Capital Hill, for action by the Senate next January, a stack of agreements resulting from the nine-power conference and the North Atlantic treaty session in London and Paris this fall. He asked the Senate to study them carefully and ratify them at the regular session.

### New Charges As McCarthy Censure Debate Continues In U. S. Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) - The hotly debated Irving Peress case turned up a couple of upsurges in the McCarthy censure row Monday, followed by a Democrat's statement that Senator Joseph McCarthy ought to be thrown out of the Senate. The expulsion suggestion was made by Senator Samuel Ervin (Dem.-N. C.), who accused McCarthy of making "foul and fantastic charges" against the committee that recommended he be censured. But Ervin said he would not formally move that McCarthy be ousted. Ervin spoke after Senator Francis Case (Rep.-S. D.), a member of the six-man committee that recommended censure of the Wisconsin Republican, announced he will vote against rebuking McCarthy on one of two pending charges. Case said new evidence supplied by Army Secretary Robert Stevens convinces him McCarthy should not be censured for alleged abusive treatment of Brig.-Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker when Zwicker testified on the Army's handling of the Peress case. Case said it now is evident that high Army officials "let Peress slip out of their grasp," and gave him an honorable discharge instead of a court-martial, even after a court-martial demand from McCarthy was delivered to the "responsible Army staff."

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### Pitdown Hoaxer Found Guilty Of Many Other Archaeological Tricks

HASTINGS, England (Reuters) - A whole series of newly-discovered hoaxes were pinned Monday on the man who fooled the world for 40 years with a bogus "Pitdown" skull. Research in the last year revealed that lawyer Charles Dawson did not end his trumphy with the skull he "discovered" at Pitdown, Sussex, about 1912. Modern bone examination methods last year proved the skull, claimed to have been that of a man of 50,000 years ago, was the jawbone of a modern ape. Now the researchers at Hastings Museum have found that many bronze axes, flint implements and spears from Dawson's collection are also fakes. In addition, they found a "History of Hastings Castle," published under Dawson's name, was written a century earlier by archaeologist William Herbert. INTERNATIONALLY KNOWN Dawson died in 1916 without any inkling that his bogus discoveries would be found out. Later his extensive collection of allegedly ancient items housed in his private museum were sold for a good price to Hastings Museum to help support his widow.

### Heavy Shipment Of P.E.I. Potatoes Over The Weekend

From midnight Friday until eight o'clock yesterday morning 215 carloads of potatoes and 19 carloads of turnips were ferried from Boden to Tormentine. While figures are not available to establish this as a record movement in that period of time, shipping officials cannot remember when such a large quantity have been moved in one weekend. Sixty-seven cars of potatoes and three cars of turnips were moved across the Straits by the "Abegweit" from Friday midnight to Saturday midnight. In the next 24 hours she took 57 cars of potatoes and 10 cars of turnips to Tormentine. At 2 a.m. on Sunday morning the second ferry, the "Prince Edward Island," went into service and with the two ships operating 91 carloads of potatoes and six of turnips were moved up until yesterday morning. C.N.R. officials state that this continuous round-the-clock service will be maintained until the congestion presently existing has been relieved. The total rail shipment of potatoes since last August shows an increase of 198 cars over the corresponding period of 1953. Shipments to date this year are 1,832 carloads, compared to 1,643 carloads the previous year.

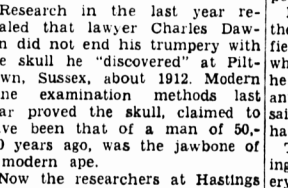
