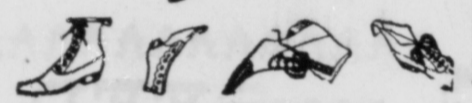

Better still to have an official where the citizens could take samples and have an authoritative test made. This would keep the vendors right and be a check upon skim milk.

TEST.

At the Exposition.

PARIS, JUNE 8.—President Loubet visited the foreign and colonial sections of the exhibition yesterday. At the British colonial section there was slight friction concerning precedence. Mr. Joseph Tarte, Canadian Minister of Public Works, refused to accept British Commissioner Jekyll's programme for the reception, on the ground that it did not give Canada the importance to which the Dominion was entitled. He insisted that President Loubet visit the Canadian section as that of a country distinct from the British possessions, otherwise he would close all the doors of that section. The point was conceded, whereupon the Canadian displayed evident gratification. The Canadian band played the "Marseillaise" with such enthusiasm that, according to the Temps, they forgot to keep time, while cries of "Long live Loubet!" and "Long live the Republic!" burst from all sides, filling the gardens with echoes. When Mr. Tarte bid farewell to the Presidents he shouted "Long Live France!"
