## Age Revelation Causes Suicide

PARIS (Reuters) - Top fashion model Anna-Lisa Cameron committed suicide here because her age was revealed, police reported here. The tall ash blonde-known as The Great Anna in the Paris fashion world - barely looked the 30 she claimed to be but actually was 40, police reported. They said her true age came out in a scene with frontier officials on a trip to West Germany last Saturday and she was found with her wrists slashed in her hotel room here. A frontier official asked The Great Anna for her passport and noted that its listing of her age had been obliterated by a cigarette burn. He asked to see her French identity card. There, too, her date of birth-Jan. 30, 1922-had been defaced. In tears, The Great Anna admitted in front of the other women that she was 40. While the other models continued the train journey to Munich, Mrs. Cameron was sent back to Paris. She failed to show up for work and her body was found.
