TALK ON ELECTRICITY.—A fairly large audience assembled last evening at the Y. M. C. A., to hear Mr. A. E. Morrison's practical talk on "Electricity Applied to the Uses of Man." Mr. Morrison, who is intimately acquainted with the various branches of the science, led his audience from the days of Galvani, Volta and Ohm down to the present, through the development and application of the principles of electro-magnetism and magneto-electricity. The principles and operation of the telegraph, cables, telephone, dynamo and motor were explained, and illustrated with numerous finely-executed diagrams and apparatus of his own construction. He was somewhat hampered, however, by having his address on paper, which was almost unnecessary for one who has such a thorough knowledge of the subject, and so much good illustrating matter on hand. A number of questions were asked by the audience during the address, and at the close a few complimentary remarks were made by the chairman, R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

THURSDAY, March 29. The House met at half-past three this afternoon. After prayers and the reading of the journals, Mr. John Ball was sworn in as Clerk, and Fredk. W. Hughes as Assistant Clerk.

Mr. McKinnon submitted the draft address in reply to the speech from the throne.

The address was received and read and made the order of the day for tomorrow.

The tender of Geo. W. Gardner for printing and binding the journals of the House was adopted. There were two other tenders in, one from The Examiner Publishing Company and the other from Hazard & Moore.

The House met again at 7:45, when Mr. Laird, from the committee appointed to prepare rules and regulations for the government of the House, submitted their report, which was received and committed to a committee of the whole House. Mr. Rogers (Alberton) in the chair. After some time progress was reported. The proceedings were of no public interest.

FRIDAY, Mar. 30. The House met this forenoon and resumed consideration of the report of the committee on rules of order. After some discussion, the report of the committee was adopted, and the House adjourned to meet again at three o'clock this afternoon.
