

A New Use for Burnt Cork.

HOW A YOUNG WHITE GIRL WAS ENABLED TO MARRY A NEGRO.

Social circles at Gardiner, near Kingston, N. Y., are greatly excited at present over the elopement and marriage of Miss Carrie M. Plant, a young white woman, with James W. Sampson, a mulatto. Miss Plant is a niece of Mr. John H. Deyo, a well-to-do farmer, residing in the town of Gardiner. After the war Mr. Deyo settled down on his farm, and as he was childless his niece, Carry Plant, was adopted into the family. During the past summer Mr. Deyo, being sick and unable to assist in the working of his farm, hired James Wesley Sampson, a young colored man about 21 years of age. He was a good worker, polite and pleasant about the house and farm, and soon won the good will and respect of those about him. After a time it was noticed that Wesley was paying Miss Plant too much attention, and her uncle two weeks ago concluded that it would be advisable to send his niece off on a visit for a month or so. But before he could make his intentions known both Wesley and his niece were missing. Search was at once instituted, but without avail. The climax was reached on Saturday last, when it was discovered that after encountering many difficulties the runaway pair had been made man and wife. Sampson and his wife, it finally leaked out, had visited a number of ministers and a justice of the peace, but under no circumstances would they listen to their entreaties to be married. They had about given up in despair, and left for the house of one James Cantine, who keeps a low resort. There the wife of Cantine (a white woman) resolved that the pair should be united even if she had to resort to strategy. It was decided that Miss Carrie's face should be blackened with burnt cork. This was done, and the pair started off to the parsonage of the Reformed Dutch church of Stone Ridge, where the pastor, without for a moment suspecting the deception, united them in wedlock. When the news reached her former home, her uncle was nearly crazed. Sampson and his wife have settled down at Lapala, a negro colony not far from this city. Miss Plant, who is now about 17 years of age, would have fallen heir to the larger part of the property of her uncle, who is estimated to be worth from \$60,000 to \$70,000.—*New York World.*

Household Hints.

To Corn and Spice a Round of Beef.—Be sure that you select a first-rate round of beef. Tie a strong twine tightly around it, to keep in shape. Then stick in cloves thickly on both sides, pressing them into the meat as far as possible. Rub the round well with three table-spoonfuls of powder sauté and plenty of fine salt. Rub in a teaspoon of sugar. Lay the beef in a wooden tray, or earthen bowl, large enough to give it plenty room, and turn it over every other day, rubbing into it all over, each time, the brine which will be made from it. Keep it in this for ten days, turning it as directed, and if it has been properly attended to it will be found delicious.

Cold meats of any kind can be made very relishing in this way: Cut or scrape all the meat carefully from the bones; chop fine, adding a small onion when chopping, pepper and salt as needed. Put two table-spoonfuls of butter into a saucepan with two table-spoonfuls of broth or stock. Set it over the fire, and as soon as hot have ready some slices of nicely browned and buttered toast; break over the meat two or three eggs, stir all quickly together, and pour over the toast. Garnish with parsley, if liked, and serve hot. If quickly done, and eaten as soon as served, this will be found delicious.

Economy Worth Practising.—Take a new flower-pot, wash it clean, wrap it a wet cloth, and set over butter; will keep it as hard as if on ice. Milk, if put into an earthen can, or even a tin one, will keep sweet for a long time if well wrapped in a wet cloth.

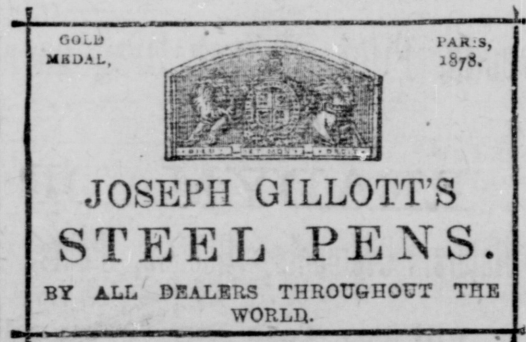
