PLUCKY PEDRO.

A Costa Rica Cowboy's Death Stroke to a Vicious Jaguar.

A wounded and maddened jaguar is a dangerous enemy, but a Costa Rica cowboy unflinchingly faced one not long ago, and Forest and Stream describes the encounter. A large cattle ranch had lost several calves and young mules, and the cowboys reported that they had seen a big jaguar sneaking away from a dead calf. The manager, therefore, offered \$25 to any man who would kill the beast. This is a large sum to a Costa Rica cowboy, and all the old muzzle loaders on the ranch were immediately loaded to the nozzle.

One morning, soon after the manager's offer, a day old calf was found with its skull crushed in. The meat had not been touched, and, believing that the big cat would come back that night for his kill, a hunt was arranged, every one going, including the dogs, and a start was made late in the afternoon.

A short ride brought the hunters to the spot where the calf had been that morning, but the carcass was not there. It had been dragged a little way off to a clump of bushes. The scent was redhot, and all the dogs were off at once, one old hound in particular baying at every jump. The cowboys and the other men followed closely.

Suddenly the barking of the dogs broke out louder than ever. They had the jaguar treed, and when the manager reached the tree the old hound lay dying from a blow of those terrible claws. The jaguar was far up in a big mountain guava tree, hugging a limb, showing only his little ugly head.

The men blazed away with their old muzzle loaders, but the cat was so high and the buckshot scattered so badly, that the fusillade had little effect, except to make the cat change its position. As it sprang for a higher limb, the manager raised his Winchester and fired.

The result was startling. Down came the jaguar, striking the ground like a bag of salt. The ball had cut the spine, so that the hind legs of the animal were paralyzed.

It struck the ground about eight feet from where the youngest cowboy, Pedro, stood. The boy had no gun, but like a flash his machete was out and he sprang at the beast. A Fascinating Place.

"Of all fascinating places under the sun," said a gentleman who has traveled much, "the island of Tahiti, one of the Society Islands, is the most fascinating. In that country, a little earth lost in a vast ocean, nature has done everything to make indolent souls happy. The climate is temperate and even all the year round the vegetation is luxuriant, the women beautiful and the nights, full of perfume and mystical light, stir the most practical mind to love of meditation and dreaming. The influence of this dreamy, lazy life is insidious. It is not necessary to work, as the island furnishes food without the labor of tillage. I know a number of Americans and Frenchmen who had gone there for a visit and have become so enraptured with the languorous existence that, like the visitors to lotus land, they lie down and forget friends, home, ambition and everything.

"I remember how I used to feel the influence steal upon me. Many a time I wished earnestly to cast my lot with those languorous people. I can look back now and see myself as I lay one night against a cocoanut tree in a sort of ecstasy of meditation. Overhead was a sky bright with a million stars. Sounds came to me in a strange fashion, blending into a murmur. A short distance away a group of natives, girls and men, were shouting the rhythmic chant of the upu-upu dance. I thought of myself on this little isle, with ocean on every side and New Orleans so many miles distant. Nothing seemed real to me but that spot in the sea, with its bright sky overhead. I could hear indistinctly the chant of the singers and the sobbing of the waves. A mysterious charm possessed me." —New Orleans Times-Democrat.

Heredity of Heterogeneous Populations.

The extreme fluidity of our heterogeneous population is impressed upon us by every phenomenon of social life here in America. We imagine the people of Europe, on the other hand, after scores of generations of stable habitation to have settled themselves permanently and contentedly into place. This is an entirely erroneous assumption. As a matter of fact they are almost as mobile as our own American types. There are two ways in which demographic crystallization may have taken place—a people may have become rigid horizontally, divided into castes or social strata, or it may be geographically segregated into localized communities, varying in size all the way from the isolated hamlet to the highly individualized nation. Both of these forms of crystallization are breaking down today under the pressure of modern industrialism and democracy in Europe as well as in America. Nor is it true that the renege of our American social life has made the phenomena of change more marked here than abroad. In fact, with the relics of the old regime on every hand the present tendencies in Europe are the more startling of the two by reason of the immediate contrast.—Professor William Z. Ripley in Popular Science Monthly.
