# Consider Income To Meet Water Rates Rearing

A motion was made at the town council's meeting last night that the council review the secretary of the Public Utilities and request a meeting with him and possibly other members of the commission along with Hon. Herbert MacNeill, M.P., provincial minister of highways, between Christmas and New Years or early in the new year, in Summerside to study the water ratification.

The motion, made by Coun. George Keay, Jr., was followed by a heated discussion brought about by a letter from the commission regarding the water rates. The discussion, pro and con, centered on the commission's proposed rate of \$3.05 per month for Summerside residents. It was felt that the town should give only two alternatives by the board - accept the commission's proposed rates or ask for withdrawal from the board and order a survey.

A letter which had been sent to Solicitor-General W. MacNaught by Mayor Morrison urging the dredging of Summerside harbor was discussed at the meeting. The letter read, "The fact that the harbor is desperately low water levels during the carnival when ships refused to call to visit Summerside is a disgrace and a source of embarrassment to the town."
