

# Equipment Presented To Tyne Valley Hospital

A new X-ray unit, purchased through the combined efforts of interested citizens from 22 surrounding districts, in addition to a new incubator and a new croupette donated by the Provincial Department of Health, were presented to the Stewart Memorial Hospital at Tyne Valley last evening, providing it with modern medical facilities, which in the words of Dr. Lorne Bonnell, Provincial Minister of Health, is equal to that of any hospital of comparable size.

The X-ray unit was accepted on behalf of the hospital by the matron, Mrs. Berntha Lidstone, R. N., and the presentation was made by Mrs. J. A. Stewart, widow of the late Dr. J. A. Stewart of Tyne Valley, in whose memory the hospital was named.

Mrs. Stewart referred to the furnishing of the hospital by the Ladies Aid Society representing many surrounding districts, with co-operation and assistance from Women's Institutes, Masonic Lodge, Canadian Legion, Young People's Societies, and the late William Burleigh, and other private donations.

She explained how the Ladies Aid had assisted the directors in sponsoring tea parties, concerts, carnivals, dances, and suppers, to raise funds for the hospital.

Referring to the nursery department of the hospital containing six bassinets, Mrs. Stewart announced that this hospital had been the place of birth for 66 babies during the past year.

### COMMUNITIES RESPOND

She recalled the need by the hospital for an X-ray machine, and how the communities had responded by providing within one year, over one thousand dollars, which was almost half the total cost of the machine.

For the effort made on behalf of the hospital, Mrs. Stewart expressed sincere appreciation to those in the Department of Health, and to residents of various districts who had made it possible to obtain the new hospital equipment.

Dr. Bonnell, Minister of Health, accompanied by Dr. H. Curtis, Deputy Minister of Health, made the formal presentation of the incubator and the croupette to the matron, Mrs. Lidstone.

He paid special tribute to the work of the general practitioner—the family doctor — and pointed out the important role he must play in the life of a community.

He complimented the district of Tyne Valley for its initiative and the results of their combined efforts, and expressed an encouraging opinion that hospital costs, within a few years would be free, but in cautioning that nothing was really free, implied that the costs would be borne collectively or indirectly.

Chairman of the program associated with the presentations was the chairman of the hospital board of directors, Dick Fourn, who introduced the various speakers.

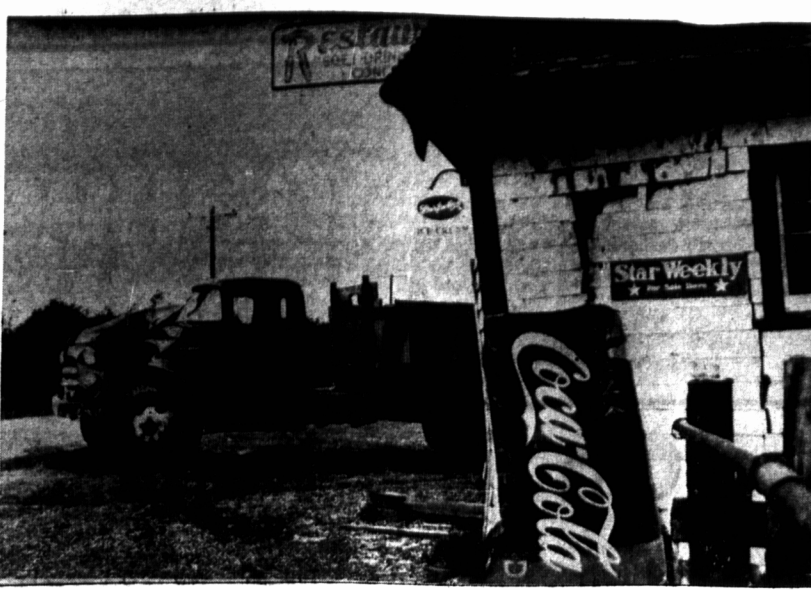
