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# Nixon May Be Republican Choice To Succeed Ike

WASHINGTON (CP)—Vice-president Richard Nixon, if he can win a precedent setting back 119 political circles here to be in the favorable position to win the Republican presidential nomination next year.

For the moment, the Republican party's hands are tied. It can take no step toward building up a potential 1956 presidential candidate until all President Eisenhower indicates whether or not he will be in the running. However, there are increasing indications that Eisenhower will retire from the field.

While few political observers would be rash enough at this stage to predict the name of the eventual Republican candidate, most of them concede that the 42-year-old Nixon has a head-start on other party aspirants. For one thing, the very fact of the president's illness has served to project the vice-president into the limelight.

**POSITION UNIQUE**

Apart from being the president's lineal heir under the United States constitution, Nixon has been given preferential treatment by Eisenhower himself as an understudy for his job. This has put Nixon into a unique position to campaign without seeming to be doing any more than performing his normal duties.

Eisenhower set a precedent by making Nixon a full participant in his cabinet and on the powerful

**POPULATION INCREASE**

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's population gained 105,000 in the three months up to Sept. 1, the bureau of statistics estimated Thursday. The 2.7-per-cent increase brought the population to 15,706,000. This was 393,000 higher than a year earlier. It was an increase of 1,697,000, or 12.1 per cent, since the last complete population count in the 1951 census.

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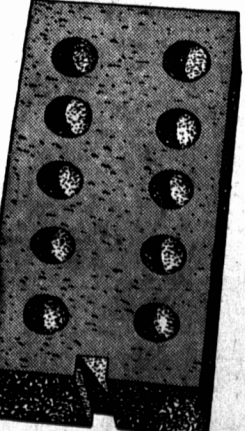
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
