

Canadian Firm Turns Out New All-Weather Jet Plane

FARNBOROUGH, England (CP)—A V. Roe of Canada has produced a new type of the CF-100 all-weather jet fighter with an operational ceiling increased by 1,000 feet, it was learned Monday.

The new plane is the CF-100 IV-C, and it boosts the operational ceiling to about 55,000 feet. This probably makes it the only fighter now in existence which could meet the threat of high-flying Russian bombers.

The extra altitude was gained by adding three feet on each wing and removing some of the heavy armament, which can be replaced by rockets.

At 55,000 feet the new CF-100 will have a speed of more than 500 miles an hour. A number have been produced and are flying.

RAF INTERESTED

It is understood that the RCAF

wanted a plane with a higher operational ceiling than the Mark IV, and that the Mark IV-C is the result.

The RAF is evaluating the CF-100 and three of them are being flown at the Farnborough Air Show here, which was opened to the press Monday. This is the first time that a military aircraft designed and produced outside Britain has appeared at the annual show.

Avro officials said the RAF is "most interested" in the Canadian fighter, but there was no immediate indication of any sales. It was also learned that Germany, Belgium and South Africa have expressed interest in the jet.

At Toronto, Fred T. Smye, assistant general manager of A.V. Roe (Canada) Ltd., confirmed reports his company is experiment-

ing with a modified version of the CF-100.

He said "several" of the modified aircraft have been produced at the company's plant in suburban Malton and have been test flown. He said they have not yet been outside the Toronto area.

Mr. Smye described reported performance figures for the aircraft as "speculation" and declined to confirm or deny them or to discuss the company's plans for the plane.

Report 45 Million Homes Are Destroyed

GENEVA (AP)—The current floods in India and east Pakistan have wrecked more than 28,000 villages and have damaged or destroyed the homes of 45,000,000 persons, a report received by the League of Red Cross Societies said Monday.

Seven United States Air Force transport planes left Geneva for New Delhi and Karachi, the Indian and Pakistani capitals, Monday with the first 20 tons of Red Cross relief supplies for the flood victims, mostly medicines and blankets.

ber constantly. In addition, all Russian shipyards are busy producing naval craft with oil tankers the only type of merchant vessels now being built in the country.

Oil tankers "are considered to be of strategic importance for the fueling of naval vessels operating in foreign waters."

The new estimate of Soviet intentions also is based, the writer said, on a 21,000 mile secret cruise early this year by one of Russia's latest long-range snorkel type submarines, from Murmansk to the Antarctic and back.

SIX WEEKS EACH WAY

The submarine traveled under water for 14 hours a day on a trip that took six weeks each way. It was followed at some distance by an auxiliary vessel and was met in the Antarctic by the Soviet whaling fleet "Siava."

The Russians are described as building far-ranging fishing fleets, equipped with radar and planes.

"There is little doubt that it is only a question of time before the U.S.S.R. demands the right to establish a permanent base in the Antarctic for her whaling and research activities," the writer says.

NEW ATTACHE

OTTAWA (CP)—Lt. Col. Gordon D. Dailley, 44, of Winnipeg will leave for Yugoslavia next month to take over from Col. L. E. Kenyon, 40, of Beamsville, Ont., as military attache to the Canadian embassy at Belgrade, the army announced Monday. The new attache will be promoted to acting rank of colonel. Col. Kenyon's new appointment will be announced later.

Church Of England In Canada Changes Name

EDMONTON (CP)—The Church of England in Canada has changed its name to the Anglican Church of Canada.

The new title was approved Tuesday night by the Upper and Lower Houses of the general synod when they met in joint session here.

The name change follows 55 years of debate, with both houses voting down an amendment which would have designated the Episcopal Church of Canada as the official title.

The vote—23 to 4 in the Upper House and 174-90 in the Lower House—endorsed a recommendation of the committee set up in 1954 to study the name question.

DEBATE QUESTION

The 300 delegates also spent more than two hours debating the question of the fixed primatial see and then referred the question back to the Upper House for further consideration.

The motion finally passed asked that "if possible, a submission of a fresh recommendation be made to this synod."

The see, the area over which the primate has jurisdiction, now is Rupert's Land. The present primate, Most Rev. Walter Foster Barfoot, also is metropolitan and bishop of Rupert's Land.

Chancellor R.H. Soward of Toronto sparked debate by initiating a move to have the primate see fixed in Toronto. He said he felt the primate should be freed from diocesan duties to give him more time as leader of the church in Canada.

Rt. Rev. G.N. Luxton of London, Ont. bishop of Huron, said the problem should not be settled on a dollar-and-cents basis and that he disliked the division between east and west on the question.

CANTERBURY IN CANADA

He said he was not voting against Winnipeg—Archbishop Barfoot's present headquarters and said that "I have always had it in my heart there should be a Canterbury somewhere in Canada a place for a pilgrimage. I plead for a permanent solution to this problem even if we have to wait another 20 years for it."

Archbishop Barfoot said he at no time expressed a wish that the fixed primatial see should be part of the diocese of Rupert's Land.

Island Housewife

She started her swim with the crowd, making three miles in the first hour and forty minutes. She used the side and breast strokes for most of the distance, however. The water was calm and about 65 degrees when she entered it. It roughened, and became quite choppy about 3:00 A.M. The wind was favorably Henry Elliot was employed in directing a spotlight on the water to watch out for lobster buoys. There were about 200 people gathered at the Borden pier to see Mrs. Peters complete her swim. She gave much of the credit for her success to her helpers, especially Don Smith and Captain Herb MacKenzie who plotted her swim, figuring out the probable effect of the tides, wind, etc.

She left yesterday morning with her husband and two children for Sydney, N.S., where Mr. Peters is employed with a bakery.
