A STORY OF THE PRINCE.
HIS TENDER COURTESY TO THE BU-
FERING FRENCH NATION.
Her Majesty's Son Favours His Watch
Better Than Would French Suscep-
tibilities—Other Royalties in Pawn, but
None for as Good a Reason.

None of the Prince of Wales himself has
escaped the selection of pawning his
watch. That took place, however, not in
England, but in France, and of all places
in the world, at Sedan. It was about
three years after the war, and the Prince, in
the strictest incognito, was visiting the bat-
tle-fields, being anxious at all costs to
avoid recognition, as he was not to wound
French susceptibilities.

He found himself financially stranded
at Sedan, with insufficient money either
to pay his hotel bill or his railroad fare
back to Frankfurt. It was impossible to
rely on the discretion of the boniface, or
even to telegraph for funds, since that
would have revealed the Prince's identity.
At length, in sheer desperation, the
Prince sent his equerry, Col. Trossade, to
the local Mont-de-Piote with his watch,
and with the Colonel's permission, he
waited with some trepidation the success
of the Colonel's mission, since there is an
immense amount of forgeries going
through when pledging personal property
in France.

Another royal personage who has been
compelled to apply to pawnbrokers for
ready money is King Milan of Serbia, who
on one occasion, when in Vienna, Emper-
or Francis Joseph had declined to loan
him any more money to pay the heavy
taxes which he had incurred at the card
table of the Jockey Club, deliberately
pledged the jeweled sword which forms
part of the regalia of the rulers of Serbia,
and is considered one of the most valuable
relics of the Obrenovitch family.

It lay there for more than a year, and it
was only when the brokers threatened to
sell the sword to a Jew, that the Emperor
intervened, and secured its return. Unre-
deemed property that Emperor Francis
took pity on his disreputable protégé, re-
deemed it and sent it back to Belgrade.
Don Carlos of Spain, who bears the
title of Duke of Madrid, and is the head
of the historic house of Bourbon, has re-
peatedly pawned the jeweled badge of
the Golden Fleece which had belonged
in turn to Duke Charles V. of Ger-
many and Spain.

The last occasion on which he pledged
it, the matter was brought to light in a
very unsavoury fashion by a trial that took
place at Madrid. Don Carlos had intru-
ded an old general who had served him
faithfully for many years as equerry and
aide-de-camp, with the jewel to pledge
for money necessary to satisfy the expec-
tations of a friend belonging to the Parisian
demimonde, who was traveling with him
at the time, and at the end of the cus-
tomary period was disappointed for sale.
This, of course, created a great sensation,
which reached the ears of the Prince's
relatives.

Asked to explain how the decoration
came to be pawned, in order to get him-
self out of a scrape, he had the audacity
to allege that it had been pawned with-
out his knowledge by his devoted and
trusted equerry, who had converted the
money to his own use. He evidently
counted upon the general's loyalty to
bear the blame in silence, and the latter
might have done this had not the author-
ities commenced a criminal prosecution
against him. This was more than the old
soldier could bear, and he, too, was
Don Carlos entering the witness-box to
testify against him, he made a clean
breast of the whole affair and furnished
documentary proof of the fact that he
had merely acted in compliance with the
instructions of his ungrateful master.

during the past twenty years, spent much
more time in the vaults of Messrs. Atter-
borough in London than on the table of
the central figure of Dauber's "Kings in
Exile."

year in stealing during shopping expedi-
tions, a habit euphemistically styled klep-
tomania. The number of titled ladies seized
with this sin is mainly white ex-
ecuting the fashions of Paris, he tells us,
is almost incredible. Among the recent
culprits were a Russian Duchess and the
daughter of a reigning sovereign. As a
rule, these more distinguished offenders
are let off on the payment of a round sum
for the relief of the poor, and when the
shopkeeper is known to be rich the sum
exact is raised to as much as 10,000 francs.
The police authorities consent to this
sort of condonation.

foot or your left shoe on your right foot,
nor must you put your left shoe on before
the right unless you want bad luck. This
superstition dates back to one of the emperors
of Rome, who, it is recorded, put on his
left shoe first one morning, and came near
being assassinated during the day.

A Ring Cut Out of a Single Diamond.
A ring so cut was exhibited at the
Antwerp Exhibition, where it was the
admiration of the diamond cutters and
merchants, being the first successful at-
tempt to cut a ring out of a single stone.
There are a great many difficulties in this
method of cutting diamonds, as the stones
have a certain cleavage and particular
veins, all of which have to be carefully
studied in order to prevent any splitting
of the stone just as success seems within
reach. After several unsuccessful at-
tempts and three years' labor, the feat
was accomplished by the pasteur and
skill of M. Antoine, one of the best
known lapidaries of Antwerp. The ring
is about six-eighths of an inch in di-
ameter. In the Marlborough cabinet there
is a ring cut out of one entire and perfect
sapphire.

Costly Perfumes.

the pollen from the blooming orange
tree.
