The steamer *M. A. Starr* arrived from Halifax this morning. The *Carroll* will sail for Boston at 5 o'clock this p. m.

REMEMBER the Grand Literary Entertainment by the members of the Temperance Reform Club this evening at 8 o'clock.

The steamer "Acadia" will take the place of the "Worcester" from Boston this week. She will leave Boston at noon on Saturday.

A SPECIAL train for Souris will leave Charlottetown this morning at 7.45, arriving at Souris in time for the sale of J. R. McLean's property, as advertised.

Those who have been sporting Eastward have been successful in getting large numbers of partridge. This is remarkable, in view of the great havoc made among those birds last season.

A FELLOW named Goodman was yesterday sentenced by the Stipendiary Magistrate to three months' imprisonment with hard labor, for assaulting his mother. Good enough.

HYMENEAL.—We extend our warmest congratulations to the two young persons who were pronounced one at Chatham, N. B., last evening. A reference to the proper column of this morning's paper will reveal the fact that the groom was none other than our popular fellow-citizen Mr. David T. Johnston. Mr. Johnston, with his bride, will arrive on Saturday evening, via Picton.

We have just heard that Mr. Archibald Lord's Mills of Tryon were burned this morning, with all the lumber, timber and grain in the grist mills to the ground. The mills consisted of a flour mill (said to be one of the best on the Island), a saw mill and shingle machine. There was also a store. We are very sorry to hear of this loss to the owner as well as to the whole surrounding country.—*Patriot*.

THE LICENSING BOARD.—The Licensing Board met in the Police Court Room yesterday afternoon. Messrs. Quirk and Dawson present. There were three applications for renewal of license: that of Sarah Eden, Richmond Street, for renewal of tavern license, was refused. The applicant not having the accommodation the law required,—the application of Neil McLeod, Dorchester Street, for tavern license, was also refused. The application of Owen Connolly, for store license, was granted. The Board then adjourned till the 31st inst.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, yesterday morning, Wm. Ford, drunk and incapable, was fined \$1 and costs or 8 days; Wm. McLean, same offence, was fined the same; James Goodman, drunk and disorderly, on complaint of his mother, was sentenced to three months' imprisonment with hard labor, and to find at the end of his imprisonment two good bails of \$50 each that he keeps the peace; Martin Flynn, for stealing barrels, remanded for seven days.
