But users of coal, fuel oil and ice had tougher luck. Prices for these items went up.
On the wholesale side, the Bureau found prices for industrial items slipping, but not as rapidly as in previous months and farm prices stiffening, reversing the summer trend.
The index for 30 industrial materials, based on 1935-39 equalling 100, declined by 1.6 points to 23.1 on Oct. 31 from 23.7 on Sept. 26. The farm product index, also based on 1935-39, climbed 2.9 points to 22.8 from 21.9.
As the result of the various retail price changes, the food sub-group in the new consumer price yardstick dropped to 115.1 from 115.8 during September, down from the peak of 122.5 last November. In the old gauge, the food sub-group declined to 229.3 from 234.2, down from the record 262.2 last October.

—Fought For Stronger Force
He will be remembered as the man who fought for a stronger air force in the lean years after becoming C.A.S. five years ago; saw things begin to go his way in 1948 and then crack wide open in 1950 when Korea stimulated plans for a 41-squadron force by 1954 with a manpower of roughly 50,000.
He took over a force 13,000 strong. He hands over one 37,000 strong.
He was the man who kept hammering at the theme that a fighter force should be the key element in the Canadian military establishment. He stayed on several years after the normal retirement age but there was no sign of anything but pleasure among the men immediately below him. They considered him their ablest spokesman during crucial days for the R.C.A.F.
Air Vice-Marshal Siemon is a crisp disciplinarian who joined the air force at its inception back in 1924 and was the first Canadian pilot to be trained as a military pilot after the first war.
Defence Minister Claxton once looked at a marchpast of one of his units and promptly dubbed the men "Siemon's Rockettes."

—HEADS TRAINING COMMAND
He has grown up in the air force and now is head of the Training Command with headquarters in Trenton, Ont.
An engineering graduate of the University of Manitoba, he is an Arctic expert after eight early years of photographing its wilderness. During the Second World War he held several important posts both at home and in England.
Since the war, he has been supervising and organization chief, the operations and training chief at H.Q. before going to Trenton in 1949.
This summer he went to Europe for a four-month share in planning Atlantic Pact air manoeuvres and then directed the "enemy" force in a 1,200-plane exercise.

Some reasons given were, lack of geese until much later in the season and the small number of Hungarian partridge on Oct. 1 when they have not reached their full growth.
Mr. Found also spoke on work done in Prince County by the Provincial Government which included a new dam at Malpeque repairs to the Pond at Killdare and said that plans were to reinforce the dam at Gordon's Pond near Alberton in the near future.
Dr. N. W. Smith of the Fisheries Research Board, St. Andrews, N. B., gave a very interesting address on the progress now being carried out at Ellerslie and stated that Prince Edward Island is blessed with excellent trout fishing. The speaker very satisfactorily answered many questions in connection with pond formation and fertilization.

—RUSSIAN HERO DECLARES ARMY STRONGER THAN EVER

MOSCOW, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Marshal Semeon Timoshenko, in a revolution anniversary speech, asserted today that Russian armed forces have everything they need to repel any invader and are "better able than ever before to answer an aggressor with a strong blow."
This theme was similar to that of the main speaker Thursday night at the Bolshoi Theatre on the eve of this 35th anniversary celebration of the Bolshevik revolution. Premier Stalin was present both last night, when Deputy Prime Minister Mikhail Perukhin expressed this idea, and at today's parade ceremonies which Timoshenko reviewed.
Timoshenko spoke in advance of the parade. He seemed a smaller one than ever before. He denounced "warmongers," accusing the West of intensifying an arms race and "dreaming of a new world war."
"The Soviet people can be confident Soviet armed forces are prepared to fulfill the task of defending the peaceful labor of the Soviet people," the Second World War hero said.
As his words echoed over Red Square, massed thousands of men struck up the hymn of the Soviet Union which roared out a salute, and the parade got under way.
The spectacle was led by a group of 200 drummer boys followed by massed flags, then by motorized weapons and troops.
Because of threatening weather, the customary air force flypas: was omitted.
Stalin and other leaders reviewed the parade from atop Lenin's tomb.
