The Cameron foursome started the tournament off with a bang as they walloped Bob Magie's rink, United States reigning champions, to the tune of 15-4. The Charlottetown foursome took a 4-1 lead after four ends of play in their opening match and then put the game out of reach.

Cameron's rink is composed of: Allan Smith, mate; second, George Dillon and lead, Bob Dillon. Allan Smith and Bob Dillon were both members of the Art Burke rink last year. The Burke rink represented the Island in last year's Dominion Brier and turned in a very creditable performance.

In yesterday's action the little Charlottetown skip led his team to a convincing 15-6 victory over the Northern Ontario representative and thus moved into a three-way tie for first place in the eight team tournament.

Two of the most renowned curlers in the world suffered defeats in Wednesday's action. The Ernie Richardson skipped rink representing Saskatchewan, were defeated 8-6 by the Alberta foursome. Alberta counted two in the tenth to capture the win. The Lyall Dagg skipped crew, who are reigning champions for the MacDonald Tankard Brier, went down 10-8 at the hands of the Manitoba foursome.

The Charlottetown rink took a 4-0 lead in the first end of yesterday's contest and they never looked back. They were leading 5-2 at the end of three ends and increased their lead to 10-3 at the close of six ends. Alberta, Prince Edward Island and Ontario are undefeated going into today's competition. 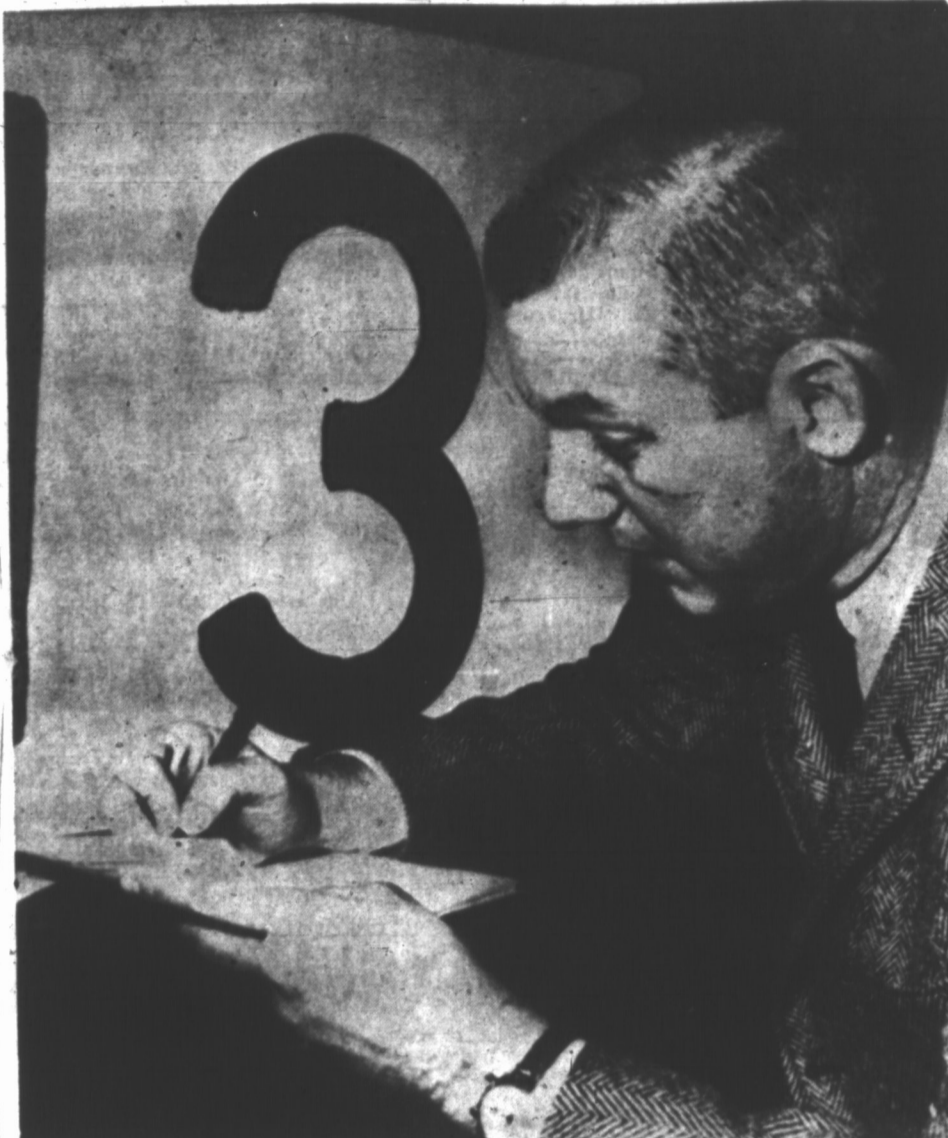

Wings Nip Canadiens Leafs Trim Black Hawks

MONTREAL (CP) - Norm Ullman's goal with 20 seconds left in the third period gave Detroit Red Wings a 5-4 comeback victory over first-place Montreal Canadiens in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night that also gave Hab goalie Charlie Hodge \$250 in league prize money as first-half Verina Trophy leader.

Two successive power-play goals by Ron Murphy had tied the score 4-4 in the wild game. The teams scored five power-play goals, three by Detroit, and both sides missed many opportunities, but goal posts gave Hodge and Detroit reminder Roger Crozier's their busiest nights in many seasons.

Alex Delvecchio and Bruce MacGregor were the other Detroit scorers. Ralph Backstrom scored twice for the Habs, who dropped their first game in their last seven starts, while Henri Richard and Claude Provost notched singles.

Montrealled 3-1 at the end of the first period and 4-3 going into the final frame. Hodge, who held a four-goal lead over Crozier for mid-season Verina honors going into the game, handled 36 shots Crozier 33.

The Verina goes to the goalie of the team with the best defensive record. After 35 games, Hodge, who now also rates high for first-half All-Star honors as well, has a two-goal advantage over Crozier. The Canadiens have been scored upon 94 times, the Wings 87.

TORONTO 3 - CHICAGO 1 CHICAGO (AP) - The crippled Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League got goals from Bob Pulford, rookie Britt Selby, and Frank Mahovlich Wednesday night to beat the slumping Chicago Black Hawks 3-1.

Chicago's goal was scored by league scoring leader Bobby Hull in the final period. It was his 33rd of the year. The loss, the second in a row for the Hawks, kept them three points behind first place Montreal Canadiens, who lost to Detroit Wednesday night. Toronto,

which won its fifth game from the Hawks in seven meetings, remains fourth behind the Red Wings.

The Leafs picked up the victory despite the fact veterans Andy Bathgate, George Armstrong and Dave Keon and rookie star Ron Ellis were out of the game because of injuries.

Aging Johnny Bower in the Toronto net saved the game for the Leafs in the first period when he made 15 of the 30 shots he was credited with. Early in the first frame, he was hit on the right eyebrow with a shot and play was halted while three stitches were taken in the cut.

Pulford's goal came in the first minute of the second period while teammate Kent Douglas was in the penalty box. Allan Stanley knocked the puck away from Chicago's Pierre Pilote and onto Pulford's stick. The centre skated in alone to beat Denis DeJordy in the Chicago cage.

Britt Selby, an amateur on a five-game trial with the Leafs, scored his marker in the first minute of the final period. He stole the puck from a collection of players behind the Chicago goal and beat DeJordy from a tough angle. Selby is a member of the Leafs Toronto Marlboros SUMMARY

Cameron Wins 4 Straight; P.E.I. Now In First Place

By IAN MACLAINE TORONTO (CP) - Doug Cameron drew to the inner circle with his last stone Wednesday night to give Prince Edward Island a thrilling 7-6 extra end victory over Ontario in fourth round play in the second annual Tournament of Champions bonspiel.

It was a sensational win for the Island foursome who remained the only undefeated rink in round-robin play as Manitoba edged previously undefeated Alberta 7-6 in another cliff-hanger that went down to the final stone before the outcome was known.

TORONTO (CP) - Prince Edward Island and Alberta rinks continued their winning ways Tuesday to remain the only undefeated foursomes after three rounds in the second annual Tournament of Champions bonspiel.

Doug Cameron's islanders nipped Saskatchewan 5-3 when the Regina rink's skip, Ernie Richardson, nudged P.E.I.'s final stone into his own shot on a difficult takeout manoeuvre in round-robin play.

The loss was the four-time world and Canadian championship quartet's second of the day following an 8-6 setback to Alberta in second-round play.

Hes Gervais's Alberta rink had little trouble with the Murray Roberts' rink from Umonville, Ont., winning 11-4.

In other third-round action, the Winnipeg rink, skipped by Hersh Lerner, downed Bob Magie's United States foursome from Duluth, Minn., 17-5, and Lyall Dagg's 1964 world and Canadian champions from Vancouver, B.C., won their first game, a 9-4 decision over the northern Ontario aggregation, the Bob Ash rink from Kirkland Lake.

SQUEAKED BY U.S. In second-round play, Ontario squeaked by the U.S., 7-6; Alberta counted two in the 10th end to nudge Saskatchewan 8-4. Manitoba downed B.C. 10-8, and P.E.I. bombed the 1964 high school championship rink from northern Ontario 15-6.

The P.E.I. - Saskatchewan match was a nip-and-tuck battle from the start as the two rinks scored in singles in the second, third, fifth, sixth and seventh ends with Richardson holding a 3-2 edge entering the ninth end.

The two rinks had drawn blanks in the first and fourth ends and Cameron deliberatively blanked the eighth in order to claim last stone in the ninth.

Cameron counted a big two in the ninth to take a 4-3 lead but Richardson had a guard around his shot rock in the 10th end. Cameron's first stone went through the house and Richardson drew in another guard to give him three in a line in front of the button.

Then Cameron set the stage for Richardson's take-out attempt when he drew to the inside rock and left the Saskatchewan rink counting just one.

Rather than send the match into extra ends, Richardson attempted a dead-on shot that would have sent the Island rock out of the house. But his stone was wide and just nudged the Island rock into his own shot.

Lerner's Manitoba rink had no problems with Magie's foursome after the second end. Lerner came up with three in the third and fourth, counted another three in the sixth and sewed it up with a five ender in the eighth.

The Alberta - Ontario match was a stalemate until the ninth end when the Gervais entry broke it open with a four count then added another point in the 10th.

The northern Ontario teen-age rink of skip Bob Ash, brother Bill, Terry Armstrong and Fred Prier never did get untracked in their third straight setback to the B.C. rink.

NEW YORK (AP) - New York Rangers rallied with three goals in the third period and defeated Boston Bruins 5-2 in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

Paul and John Downey, Paul who eat, drink and sleep hockey, were shining lights on the ice too. Paul leads goal and practices the splits a la Johnny Bower when the action is up at the other end. Sometimes he is barely able to set up housekeeping against when the tide of battle changes. John is small but belts his opponents with enthusiasm. He is a 7-year-old woman hater, and the only date he has ever had is with the penalty timer.

Travelling was fun till we hit Moncton at 3 p.m. and arrived at 9:30 in Summerside. We almost broke the sound barrier backwards. Some Saint Dunstan boys with fine voices sang some French and English songs and helped to vary the monotony of start-up stops. They had some hilarious parodies on "When the Saints come Marching in." We'd quote names of these but it's just too much. A faculty member must read this "Echo" so we'd better not.
