

NOT SATISFIED BUT

Farmer At Least Operates In A Prosperous Economy

The most vital fact of life for the Canadian farmer this year was Canada's abounding over-all prosperity.

This and growing population provided a buyer power that heaped Canadian tables with all kinds of food, but farmers contented they did not get their proper share of the prosperity. They felt the prices they got did not compensate for their rising costs.

The Canadian consumer shows some shift in his habits—eating less bread, potatoes and butter, more meat, poultry, milk, products, eggs, fruit and vegetables.

BETTER FARM YEAR Nevertheless, the country's prosperity did give farmers, government authorities and the public a substantial basis from which to work out whatever solutions farm problems may need.

It meant for one thing, that this was a generally better farm year than last year, with cash income—the amount received from the sale of farm products—estimated at \$2,600,000,000, up \$200,000,000 or 10 per cent.

It also meant that Canada has little farm surplus problem outside of wheat, and it seemed to indicate that the decline in farm income since 1951-52 has passed its low point and that any change will be for the better.

Another farm fact of life is that the farm has changed in recent years and will continue to change. Some say farms will become bigger, more mechanized, and more like a "big business" enterprise.

Others say that the bigger-and-better theme applies to only some areas of farming; and that, given productive soil, a farm property can still be built with work and a limited amount of machinery.

FARMING'S FUTURE

On the basis of comment the picture might be projected as follows:

Prairie wheat farms will continue to be large and any attempt to grow wheat on less than three-quarters of a section (480 acres) is unlikely to be profitable.

As population and demand for variety of food increases, a current tendency to more mixed prairie farming will grow and somewhat counter-balance the move to size.

The Maritimes potato grower and the British Columbia apple grower, face a different proposition. Wheat can be stored but potatoes and apples are perishable.

The risk in these products is likely to continue to be spread among relatively small owners.

One agricultural authority commented: "The small farmer is not going out of business—some of the best managers in the country are to be found on the farm."

Other views "The expert may say, 'double your herd of cows,' but perhaps he has never milked cows. One man with a milking machine can look after 20 cows, but he can't get mechanized enough to look after 40."

Another commented: "The farm won't exist unless life on it is made enjoyable enough for people to come in and live on it."

Indications are that efforts to get farmers off unprofitable farm land put it back into some productive capacity, such as forests, will be stepped up.

The western wheat surplus continued to make headlines during the year, but increased exports in the crop year ended July 31, and indications that exports in 1956-57 will be as good or better, relieved some of the urgency, despite a

record supply of the cereal.

Canada's 1956 wheat crop is estimated at 538,000,000 bushels—nine per cent above last year and 10 per cent above the average of 1945-55.

Added to this is 537,000,000 bushels carryover from last year for a total supply this crop year of 1,075,000,000 bushels.

Canadian consumption is expected to be 160,000,000 bushels and, assuming that exports are about the same as in 1955-56, the carryover next July 31 would be larger than the record carryover of 602,000,000 bushels at July 31, 1954.

Among other grain crops, rye was down to 8,600,000 bushels from 14,800,000 bushels last year; oats is up 31 per cent at 535,000,000 bushels; barley is up 10 per cent at 278,000,000 bushels; mixed grains total a record 69,000,000 bushels; and 24,000,000 bushels corn crop is above average.

Possibility of drought, which has been working north through the United States, continues to hang over the west as a question mark each year.

In general, across Canada, the farm situation showed few changes from last year, except that British Columbia production was down somewhat.

Prices were generally well maintained but most of the farm-income increase resulted from a better movement of western wheat.

In butter—a 50-cent price for No. 1—the surplus is down some 20,000,000 pounds from its peak, partly because of increased consumption and partly because of decreased production. Government officials say that a surplus of 30,000,000 to 40,000,000 pounds is needed if stable prices to the consumer are to be maintained in all seasons.
