The Summerside canning and processing firm of Jenkins Bros. Limited announced yesterday they are ready to begin construction of a new poultry eviscerating plant for chicken, fowl and turkey.

Last year local farmers were unable to market their turkeys due to eviscerating turkey and chicken being brought into the Province and placed on local markets where they were readily accepted by the consuming public.

Scores Government Delay In Potato Tariff Action

OTTAWA (Special) — In the budget here Monday, J. Angus MacLean, Conservative M.P. for Queens, sharply criticized the Government for its delays and its failure to take any action to impose a tariff on United States Potatoes imported into Canada.

States potatoes come into Canada duty-free for all but six weeks of each year whereas Canadian Potatoes are assessed a duty of 37.5 cents per hundredweight for a certain quota and a higher amount above that quota.

Heavy imports of American potatoes are flowing in to the Montreal market right now, Mr. MacLean said, to the detriment of potatoes grown in the Maritime Provinces.

Air Tanker Fleet Works To Supply Diverted Queen

LONDON (Reuters)—An air and cargo fleet Monday night shuttled between Britain and the French port of Cherbourg to supply the liner Queen Mary, victim of "blacklisting" by striking Southampton dock workers.

The 81,000 ton Queen Mary was blacklisted by Southampton dockers when she sailed for New York 12 days ago, aided by Cunard officials and Royal Navy tugs.

Seven or eight passengers in a hurry to reach England were flown to Southampton by plane. Southampton dock strikers replied to Cunard's moves Monday by demanding that union members in all British ports have "nothing whatsoever to do with the Queen Mary."

Report Iranian Premier To Quit

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Informed sources said Monday Premier Hussein Ala will resign Wednesday because of the murder of three Americans in a desert bandits' ambush.

The exact number of men with bandit leader Dadshah was not known. A price of \$10,000 was put on the head of each bandit, dead or alive.

The American victims of the ambush in the desert of southern Baluchistan province a week ago Sunday were Mr. and Mrs. Kevin Carroll and Brewster Wilson. Carroll, 37, was a technical aid official and Mrs. Carroll, 35, worked as his secretary. Wilson, 35, was a development specialist for the Near East Foundation.

N. B. McLean Sails From Corner Brook

CORNER BROOK, Nfld. (CP) The transport department icebreaker N.B. McLean left here Monday to aid two sealing vessels jammed in St. Lawrence Gulf ice. The Arctic Prowler with 85 men aboard was jammed off Cape Ferole near the Strait of Belle Isle, while the Terra Nova was icebound off Parsons Pond, 85 miles north of Corner Brook. Both ships reported they were in no immediate danger but the transport department said the Prowler had broken her rudder and was using a luty rudder made from a plank.

Macmillan Gives Bermuda Report

LONDON (Reuters)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan said Monday Britain will be free to fit her own nuclear warhead on American "lend-lease" guided missiles, to be supplied to Britain soon without their atomic punch.

He noted that "the power and authority of the Canadian government are continuing to grow in international affairs" and added that he is "very hopeful" that a full conference of Commonwealth prime ministers can be arranged in London during the summer.

Macmillan reviewing the results of the Bermuda talks in a House of Commons debate, said that as long as Britain relies upon the U.S. for the warheads, decisions on the use of the rockets will be a matter for both governments.

Opposition Leader Hugh Gaitskill expressed his approval of the Commonwealth conference plan and added his appreciation of Canada's willingness to make uranium available to Britain.

TRADE WITH CHINA

Among these, he mentioned the question of trade with China and Britain's concern over distortion of the structure of the United Nations through persistent use of the veto in the security council.

On the Middle East, he said the U.S., far from wishing to reduce British influence in the area, is anxious to see it reinforced. But chances of a permanent Arab-Israeli settlement are not hopeful.

GREAT SAVING

He said the missile deal would mean a great saving to Britain. Meanwhile, the prime minister made clear a pending series of British H-bomb test explosions in the South Pacific area of Christmas Island will go on, despite protests here and elsewhere—particularly in Japan.

Macmillan touched briefly on his talks with Prime Minister St. Laurent, which he described as "two excellent days of conversation of that intimate character that we always have within the Commonwealth."
