

Expecting New Political Drive By Reds In Europe

WASHINGTON (AP)—United States officials expect Moscow to start a powerful new political offensive in Western Europe in the immediate future.

The drive is expected to stir up a cold war front that has been relatively quiet for months. Since the "summit" conference last July Moscow has concentrated on South Asia and the Middle East.

Nikita S. Khrushchev, Communist party secretary, laid out the strategy for the new operation in his speech to the 20th Communist party congress in Moscow this week.

Khrushchev told Communist leaders they should make an all-out effort to arrange "united front" action with political groups like the Social Democrats in Western Europe. He gave them a positive argument by declaring that the Communist countries are leading a drive for peace. Opposing this drive, he said, are "reactionary forces" of the "capitalist monopolies."

Khrushchev then sought to remove a contradiction in Communist doctrine which has trapped the Reds in their pretensions to peace in the past. They have put themselves forward as the only true advocates of peace even though their own doctrine held that war between communism and capitalism was inevitable. Khrushchev said it was not inevitable or necessary and that "peaceful co-

Roy Boates suggested that a year's leave of absence be applied for on behalf of Bill Currie.

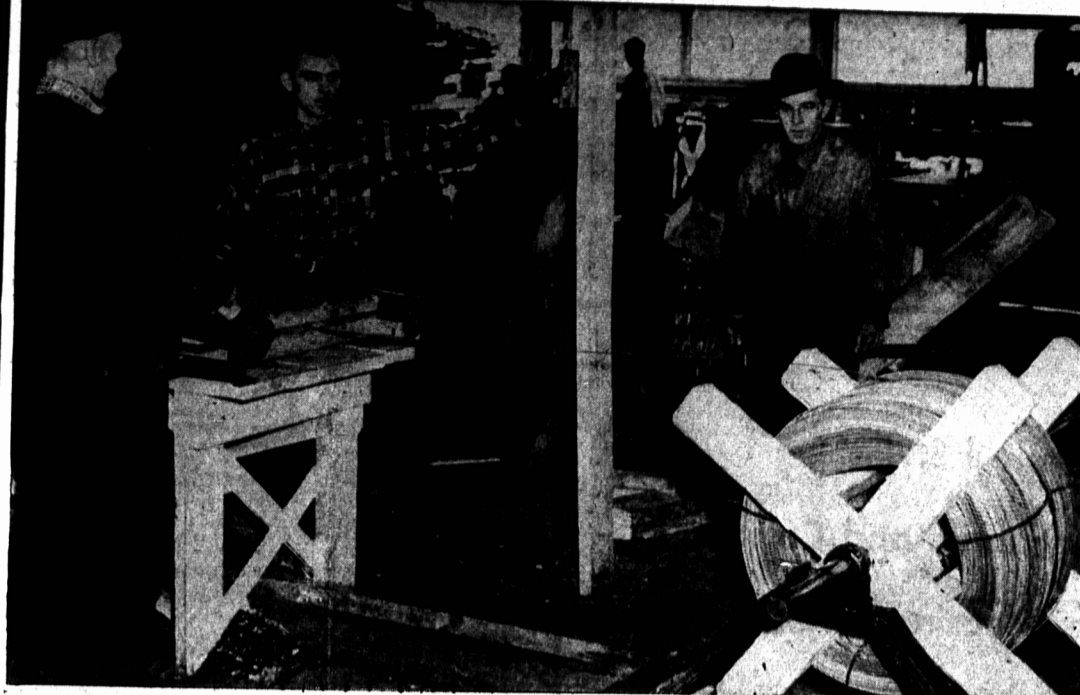
Eric Tanton, reporting on Boy Scouts and Cubs activities stated that a church parade would be held this Sunday.

Ingenuity Aids Salvage Job

The ingenuity of two Summerside men resulted in the construction of the equipment, seen above, being used in the gigantic task of checking, splicing, and rewinding miles and miles of electric light wire that was salvaged from the destruction that resulted in the January ice storm.

The progress in this work hastened greatly by the machine shown in operation, which was built by Harvey Woodside in co-operation with Ken Bell, electrical technician with the Summerside Electric Light Department.

The wire is fed through a part of the machine and on to an electrically driven reel which winds it into high coils each weighing one ton.

In the process the wire is examined, straightened, spliced and made ready for service again.
