Island-Known Bacteriologist Dies In Halifax

The death occurred early yesterday of Mr. Wendell "Moon" Mullan, 41, at his home, 29 Blink Bonnie Terrace, Dartmouth, N.S.

Mr. Mullan, who was well-known throughout the fisheries industry of this province, was a native of Ottawa, Ont. He served with the RCAF during World War Two and received his BSc in Agriculture from the Ontario Agricultural College in 1949.

Later the same year he joined the inspection service of the federal department of fisheries at Halifax as a bacteriologist. He served in all parts of the Maritime provinces and at the time of his retirement earlier this year was chief bacteriologist for the Fish Inspection Laboratories of the Maritime Provinces.

In 1963, Mr. Mullan received his Master of Science from the University of New Brunswick for post graduate studies he conducted on the self-cleaning of clams. He also contributed several other papers in the field of fish spoilage and plant sanitation.

Mr. Mullan is survived by his wife the former Jean Besile of Sherbrooke, Que. and six children, also his father, M. E. Mullan and one sister residing in Ontario.

His remains are resting at the MacDonald Funeral Home, Ochterloney Street, Dartmouth, from where the funeral will be held Monday.

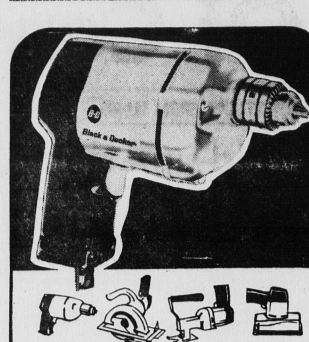

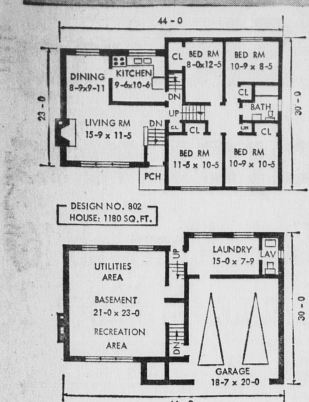

Charlottetown Fire Officials List Holiday Dos And Don'ts

Charlottetown Fire Chief H. E. Jewell and Fire Inspector Louis Rankin have urged all citizens to follow the fire safety rules drawn up by the Bureau of Fire prevention, in order to make this Christmas a safe and happy one.

The Christmas tree should not be dried out; it should be kept in water, well-supported, and kept away from sources of heat.

As for the lighting of the tree, it is best to use only approved electric lighting sets which have been checked for frayed wires. Fuses over 15 amperes should not be used and if the wiring is extensive a competent electrician should be called. All tree lights should be turned off before retiring.

Decorations, wrappings and gifts are also a possible source of fires. Whenever possible non-combustible decorations should be used and Christmas wrappings should not be accumulated in the home.

All youngsters like to receive toys for Christmas but these too could cause a serious fire. Toys operated by alcohol or gasoline or other inflammable liquids can be dangerous. Electric trains should not be set up under the Christmas tree. The surest guarantee of safety when buying electric toys is to look for the stamp of approval.

Other precautions to follow are, do not smoke handy tapers, guard against sparks from fireplaces, and place matches out of reach of small children.

In safety's interest it would also be wise to have some form of suitable fire extinguisher handy.

The meetings, which will not be open to the public, will seek to present considered opinion on the merits and consequences of the idea of Atlantic Union, which will be open to the public.

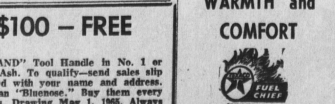
