

SPORT ECHOES

After winning eight straight games in the Island league, the Aces finally hit the skids Monday night against the Charlotte town Royals. When the Aces decide to take a tumble they don't fool around. We were prepared for a defeat at one of the Charlottetown clubs sooner or later but certainly not by such a lopsided score as 8-1.

Although the Royals strengthened their line-up by the addition of Junior MacLeod, Orin Carver and Frank Roper, and were virtually an all-star team from the Capital city, this in our opinion, was no good reason why the hitherto high-flying Aces should make such a disastrous crash landing.

They got off on the wrong foot, probably given a little push in the wrong direction by a soft goal and then a disputed goal, and the first thing we knew they were being widely outplayed in just about every department of the game.

Some fans might be inclined to argue with our statement that Charlottetown iced what amounted to an all-star team that night. Well, we know that the team could have been strengthened from the standpoint of depth. They could have added a third line of top-notch players from Charlottetown. But we doubt if they could assemble on the ice at one time six stronger players than saw action for the Royals Monday evening.

As we said before, however, the Aces have still no very good alibi for defeat. We wouldn't have thought the cream of the crop in Charlottetown could have handed them an 8-1 drubbing. Fact is, we still don't think so. The only explanation that seems to fit the situation is that the Aces had an off night. Let us Prince County fans fervently hope so anyway.

From the standpoint of good hockey matches we can't see anything wrong with the Royals, Juniors and Navy reinforcing their line-ups a bit when they

play the Aces. It probably makes for better games. But for this sort of thing to go on in an organized league is, we think, strictly for the cuckoos. We don't exactly agree with those who lay the blame on the league executive. After all the executive would have to have a report of this infraction of the rules in the form of a protest from the Aces before they could take any action. And we do not think the Aces management is prepared to make any protest.

As a kid, have you ever played hockey on a pond and let a certain freckle faced kid make all the rules because he owned the puck and might decide to go home with it if you protested too vigorously? The Aces are much in the same position. They had a hard job persuading the Charlottetown teams to let them in the league in the first place, and they do not want to do anything that might break up the league, as crazy as it is being conducted at the present time.

This flouting of rules and regulations could lead to a sort of anarchy in Island hockey, however. Would it not be better to have, say, two teams from Charlottetown, and let those clubs play only with their own players?

Be that as it may, both Charlottetown and Summerside have registered under the banner of Intermediate "A" division, and there is bound to be a play-off between the two before very long. If the Aces are not quite so weak as they appeared Monday night, and we don't think they are, this series should be a close, exciting struggle all the way. If we're mistaken in this, you can't blame us for dreaming at any rate.

HUNTERS CORNER

This Month Of January Is Typical Winter One

January bids fair to go down on record as being the most typical winter month for many long years. I fail to recollect any previous January that produced so much sunshine. Conditions at the moment are ideal for wood or pulp cutting, hauling, travelling or outdoor skating. A night or two ago the thermometer dropped to 14 deg. below zero in some areas but moderated after day-break. January has also been a good month for our wildlife. Our Huns and pheasants are taking things in their stride and black ducks that pulled up stakes and were almost non-existent at the close of the season on December 9th, are again with us in good numbers.

It's passing strange that every time I mention pheasants or hear about them I think of "Duck." It made me feel so good to read in a recent column of his where he commented on the "tremendous" number of pheasants that showed up during the tough spell of winter we experienced in December. Duck can do a right about turn in full stride. One second he is heading east under a full head of steam and before one can say "Jack Robinson" he's pointed west with the "throat wide open."

Early in the spring, before any releases of pheasants were made, I wrote in my column that it was my personal conviction that our pheasants were coming back strong under their own power and that a conservative estimate placed the number of pheasants in Queens County at a minimum of three thousand. My rival columnist pretty near blew a fuse on that one. Hunting results this

past fall shows that I was short in my estimate as it is generally conceded that approximately double that number were bagged by hunters. While no exact figure on the number of hunters in Queens County is available due to the fact that farmers, their families and hired help, with commercial fishermen in the same status, are exempt from having to purchase a hunting license. The generally accepted number is a minimum of four thousand. I feel that at least

Charlottetown teams seem to have found the weak link in Summerside Aces' hold on league supremacy and last evening Windy Steele's lads bowed to the Navy Tars by the score of 8-5 in a very fast and exciting game at the Sports Arena.

This is only the second defeat suffered by the Aces since entering the circuit. Monday evening the Royals defeated them in their own back yard by the lopsided score of 8-1.

The line of Arsenal, Carroll and Kane accounted for five of the Navy markers, with Arsenal scoring once in each frame and Jack Kane picking up a pair. Other goals for the Tars were scored by Street, Shepherd and Longaphie.

The Aces opened the scoring with less than four minutes of play gone by in the first period on a goal by Deighan. At the 8:08 mark Jack Kane evened the score and a minute later Arsenal put the Tars in front.

Navy outscored Aces 2 goals to one in the middle stanza. Lone goal for the Western squad in this frame was scored by Howatt.
