

# American League Captures 27th All-Star Game 5-3

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Yogi Berra's two-run homer powered the American League to a 5-3 victory over the National League Monday in the 27th all-star game featured by five four-baggers.

Rocky Colavito, Cleveland's slugging outfielder, and Frank Malzone, Boston's flashy third baseman, also hit home runs for the Americans, while Frank Robinson of Cincinnati and Junior Gilliam of Los Angeles connected for the Nationals.

A paid attendance of 54,982 highly partisan fans sat silently throughout most of the two hours and 42 minute game, an unprecedented all-star contest in the same stadium. They had a chance to cheer in the last half of the ninth when Robinson opened with a single, his third

hit, and Wally Moon coaxed a walk from Cal McLish. The veteran Cleveland righthander, however, checked off the last threat by disposing of the next three batters without a ball leaving the infield.

**WALKER GETS WIN**

Jerry Walker, first of five American League pitchers who limited the National League sluggers to half a dozen hits, was credited with the victory the first time he ever appeared in an all-star classic.

The 20-year-old Baltimore righthander a year ago Monday was playing for Knoxville in the South Atlantic League. He hurled the first three innings, allowing two hits and one run. He walked one and struck out one.

The defeat was charged to Don Drysdale, one of the National League heroes in its 5-4 triumph over the Americans in the first all-star contest in Pittsburgh, July 7. The big Dodger righthander did not look like the same pitcher who hurled a perfect three innings then. He was rapped for four hits in his three-

inning tenure, when the Americans picked up their first three runs on homers by Malzone and Berra. The latter's is the third giving the Americans a lead they never lost.

**SHARE THE HONORS**

Veteran righthanders Early Wynn of Chicago, Hoyt Wilhelm of Baltimore, and Billy O'Dell, young Oriole southpaw, shared pitching honors with Walker and McLish. Each gave up only one hit as the Nationals were unable to collect more than one in any inning.

Aside from Drysdale, the National League pitchers acquitted themselves nobly. Philadelphia's Gene Conley, who hurled the fourth and fifth innings, retired six of the seven batters he faced, with only a walk to Pete Runnels to mar his work. Sam Jones of San Francisco yielded an unearned run in his two inning stint. Eloye Face, the brilliant relief pitcher of the Pittsburgh Pirates, allowed the other American League run, this one coming on a tremendous eighth inning home run by Colavito.

**ALWAYS A BRIDESMAID** and never a bride, is a phrase that has held more truth than fiction for the Chicago White Sox over the past 10 years. This could be the year the Hose become wedded to their first pennant since long before Paul Richards changed the club from a second division outfit to a contender.

There is no doubt about it; the Sox are taking dead aim at the American League flag. They have been playing some inspired baseball. A team of more or less hitless wonders - there isn't a really good long ball hitter on the club - the Sox have been making up for their deficiencies in that department with inspired defensive play and making the most of the miserably few hits they do get.

**TRUE THEIR LEAD** is but three games and with those heavy hitting Indians hot on their heels the AL flag is a long way from being sewed up. But Al Lopez means business.

Over the weekend the Sox whipped the Senators twice. Now, while beating the Senators twice or even three times in one afternoon certainly doesn't label any team a pennant winner - it was the means by which the Sox won that makes you stand up and take notice.

The Sox were down 2-1 in the last of the ninth when a couple of lanky singles, walks and a bunt pulled a victory from sure defeat. It was the 26th one-run victory for the Chicagoans this season. This item along stamps the White Sox as a team of championship quality. Over the years the teams that grab the lion's share of those one-run decisions invariably wind up on top of the loop.

**AS THE WHITE SOX** move steadily towards the pennant, the rest of the league, with the possible exception of the St. Louis Cardinals, have been falling off the pace. The most notable of these is the New York Yankees, who when the final results were in Sunday night found themselves 12 games behind. Even the Yankees' so called "farm team" Kansas City Athletics were ahead of them, which is sure evidence that the once mighty Bombers have indeed fallen on evil days that the sweep four consecutive pennants and 10 in the past 12 years.

In fact, it is still difficult to believe that a team that could could fall apart so completely. There are some obvious reasons of course - injuries to several key players and the failure of the pitching staff to live up to anything near what was expected of it - but these hardly account for the complete disaster that has befallen the Yanks. It is likely that no one knows why these things happen. They just do thereby adding a little spice to the world of sports.

Although undoubtedly welcomed by many fans, it will be a strange thing to see a World Series without the Yankees in it.

**ABOUT THE ONLY** thing the Bombers have to cheer about this year is the performance of reliever Ryne Duren. The fastest pitcher in either league, Duren Sunday fanned seven batters in 3 2/3 innings of shutout pitching as the Yanks beat Kansas City. It was typical of his performances during the past few months.

**THE KINGS COUNTY** baseball League, we understand, will be finishing up its regular schedule of games this Sunday and the all important playoffs will be following hard on the heels of the final game.

Only one game was played Sunday in the loop and it brought good news for Mount Stewart fans. The Mount boys levelled Souris 14-0, but it wasn't the size of the victory that brought joy to the hearts of fandom in that area as much as the performance of pitcher Art Coffin. Art hurt his elbow some weeks ago and since that time he hadn't been seeing very much action. He was taking the mound for only three and four innings at a stretch, but Sunday's full distance two-hit shutout over Souris proved beyond a doubt that he was back in top shape again and in time to lead his teammates into the playoffs.

**LARY MacPHAIL**, a former baseball owner who once advocated no less than four major baseball Leagues, believes the recently formed third major league will flop with a bang. MacPhail doubts that a completely independently born league could survive. "There are still eight or 10 cities which deserve - and could support major baseball and it seems to me the best way to give it to them would be by expanding the two existing leagues," says he.

MacPhail brings up the often asked and not yet answered question: "Where are they going to get the ballplayers?" and adds another one "and where are they going to get the ballparks."

Meanwhile International League President Frank Shaughnessy observes "they'll be calling themselves a major league and we'll actually have better talent than they will."

**THESE EXPANSION** ideas apparently set football men to thinking also. Last week National Football League Commissioner Bert Bell told a Senate antimonopoly committee that a new major football league was in the making. He said the league would start operating next year.

The league plans to field teams in New York, Houston, Denver, Minneapolis, Dallas and Los Angeles.

## FRANCONA OWNS HIGHEST AVERAGE

# Hank Aaron, Kuenn Are League Batting Leaders

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Although he owns the highest average among the regulars and has been one of the outstanding surprises of the 1959 season, Tito Francona of Cleveland has virtually no chance of winning the American League batting championship.

As the majors take a one-day respite from the heated pennant scramble, Francona shows a .417 percentage in 74 games. He had seven hits in Sunday's doubleheader against Baltimore.

However, the 25-year-old outfielder, who was acquired from Detroit last March 21 in a trade

for Larry Doby, has had, only 218 official at bats. This coupled with 16 bases on balls, four sacrifices and one hit by pitcher gives him 297 total appearances. To qualify for the title with the required 477 total appearances, Francona would have to collect 200 additional appearances in the Indians' remaining 50 games.

Francona began playing regularly on June 2. Before then he had four hits in 14 tries for a .286 average. He now has 90 hits, including 18 doubles, one triple total is 50.

The actual batting leaders are and 11 homers. He's RBI Harvey Kuenn of Detroit in the American League and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee, in the National.

**KUENN HAS 343**

Kuenn, out most of last week with an injury, had one hit in three trips and his average remained at .343. He took over the top spot as Roger Maris of Kansas City slumped to fourth place. Maris had only three safeties in 28 at bats and lost 18 points to .326.
