

Hornets Have String Broken By Rochester

 Rochester Americans moved into a first-place tie with Pittsburgh Hornets in the Western Division of the American Hockey League Sunday night with a 3-1 win over Pittsburgh that ended the Hornets' unbeaten string of 12 games. In the other Sunday games, Cleveland won its fifth straight, whipping Buffalo 3-1, while Providence bombed Springfield 10-1.

In Saturday's only game, Baltimore downed Hershey 5-3. Gerry Khamas scored two Rochester goals, the first coming early in the first period while the Hornets' Ted Taylor was in the penalty box. Red Armstrong scored the other Rochester goal. The Hornets got one back in the second period when Don McKeeney scored before Eham finished the scoring in the third period.

In Buffalo, Cleveland won their fifth straight, handling the Bisons their 10th straight defeat. The Barons led all the way from the time Gary Schall scored early in the first period when the Bisons were short-handed. Wayne Schultz made it 3-0 before the end of the opening period.

Wayne Larkins got Buffalo's only goal in the second period and Joe Santor closed the scoring with less than three minutes to play in the final period.

FEUD ENDED
 The Springfield defeat came after the Indians players had ended their feud with owner Eddie Shore by winning Friday night. Shore had previously suspended four players for what he called "indifferent play." The players threatened re-

tion unless the four were reinstated but patched up their differences before Friday's game in which Springfield defeated the Reds 9-3.

Three of the previously suspended Springfield players, Brian Kilrea, David Amadio and Dale Rolfe, played in Sunday night's game. Bill White, also reinstated, was not in uniform.

Eddie Kachur paced the Providence attack with three goals. Tom Goegan, Pierre Gagne and Adam Keller contributed two goals each, while George Kelly counted the other home tally.

Kilrea scored Springfield's only goal in the first period.

In the only game Saturday, Willie Marshall turned in his 21st career three-goal night as Baltimore whipped Hershey for the first time in four meetings this season.

The Clippers, paced by Marshall's first two goals and others by Sandy McGregor and Doug Robinson, jumped to a 4-0 lead through the first two periods.

Hershey came back strong in the last period on goals by Roger DeFerdoy, Bruce Cline and Gil Gilbert.

Soccer Star Gets Winner

LONDON (CP)—Robert Hunt, a star of England's World Cup team, Monday scored a vital goal that gave Liverpool a Christmas soccer double over Chelsea and the joint leadership of the English League.

Liverpool defeated Chelsea 3-1 at Chelsea Saturday.

That gave Liverpool 30 points from 22 games and put them level with Manchester United.

Manchester, playing without their suspended England star, Nobby Stiles, lost 2-1 to Sheffield United.

Liverpool, the reigning champions, have a slight edge over Manchester on goal average.

 Hunt scored Liverpool's winning goal after Bobby Tambling had scored for Chelsea and evened the score.

In the Sheffield United-Manchester game, fighting broke out in the stands and police ejected 15 fans. Three men were taken to hospital.

A police spokesman said the injured spectators had been struck by flying bottles or beer cans.

This was the first game Manchester had played without Stiles, who has started a three-week suspension. They held Sheffield to 1-1 at half-time, but burly centre-forward Mick Jones got the winner for Sheffield.

Australia Bests India In Tennis

 MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Fred Stolle and Roy Emerson, Australia's Davis Cup veterans, shot the Aussies into a 2-0 lead over India in the challenge round as expected yesterday by winning the first two singles matches in straight sets.

Australian captain Harry Hopman immediately afterward forecast an Australian doubles victory today to retain the cup, symbolic of world amateur tennis supremacy. He selected John Newcombe and Tony Roche, rated the outstanding combination in the world, to meet India's Ramanathan Krishnan and Jaidoop Mukherjee, who both lost in the singles.

Stolle virtually decided the best-of-five-match series in the first singles when he swamped Krishnan 6-0, 6-3, 6-4 before near capacity crowd of 11,000. Most experts had felt Krishnan, India's No. 1 player, had to win both his singles for the Indians to have a chance.

Emerson followed with a 7-5, 6-4, 6-3 triumph over the inexperienced, but stubborn Mukherjee.

Hopman earlier had predicted his heavily-favored Australians would win at least 4-1—the final two singles matches are Wednesday — while most everyone else forecast a sweep.

WINS FIRST 3 GAMES
 Stolle, winner of the United States championship this year, won the first three games and increased it to 5-1 before Krishnan rallied briefly.

Stolle swept through the second set in 16 minutes and only in the third set did Krishnan give him trouble. The Indian led 5-3 and had Stolle down 15-40 before the Australian powered back to win.

Stolle's service—he had 12 aces to none for Krishnan—proved the difference as Krishnan was able to break only once in the match.
