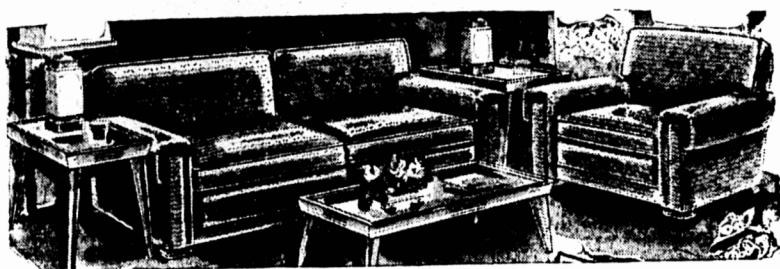

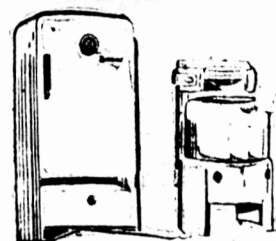

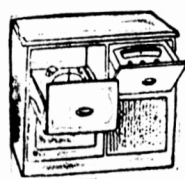

Early in the morning of April 23rd, 1951, Miss Margaret Anne Jones passed peacefully away in the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

The remains were conveyed to Hazelbrook Baptist Church where the service was conducted by the Rev. James D. Davison, pastor of Charlottetown Baptist Church, who spoke kindly words of comfort and inspiration to those present. Hymns sung were: "Safe In the Arms of Jesus," and "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." A solo, "The Old Rugged Cross," was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Harold Carver.

Interment was in the family plot in Hazelbrook Cemetery. The pall-bearers were: A. Roy, Frank and Wilbur Jones, Edward MacPhail, Lorne Jenkins and Boswell Carver.

A number of nephews and nieces in the Province and elsewhere, including relatives and friends, are left to cherish her memory.
