DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Important Resolution Passed.

Government Majority Twenty-two.

Foster Makes a Grand Speech.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5. In the House yesterday, Desjardines moved the same resolution he introduced as an amendment to Cartwright's amendment, to go into committee of ways and means, and which he subsequently withdrew to re-produce now. The resolution approved of the present fiscal policy of the Government, and trusted that any trade negotiations with the United States would be conducted with a view to the maintenance of our relations with the Mother Country, and disapproving of unrestricted reciprocity and commercial union.

A sharp debate followed. Foster made the grandest speech of his life, lasting nearly three hours. The galleries were packed while Foster exposed the hollow-ness of the unrestricted reciprocity. He lashed Cartwright till the latter raged and fumed, and interrupted with noisy abuse. Cartwright was never seen in such a terrible rage. Seriver spoke, and repudiated Laurier and Cartwright for advocating discrimination against Great Britain. This made Cartwright furious. Savard, member for Chicoutimi, publicly severed his connection with the Grits, and voted for the resolution. A division was taken at three o'clock this morning. The resolution was carried by 99 to 77—a majority of 22. Thirty-six members were absent.

THE TARTE-McGREGGEE CASE

Murphy's Evidence Contradicted.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5. In the Tarte-McGreevy committee yesterday, Martin Foley and Herbert Carbery, of Quebec, flatly contradicted Owen Murphy's evidence that they received money from him for election purposes. Expert engineers presented a report showing that Larkin & Connolly's tender was not really the lowest by a trifling amount, as reported by Boyd, but that it is quite possible were Boyd alive he could explain satisfactorily.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS ENQUIRY.

A Satisfactory Explanation.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5. In the Public Accounts Committee, Barron (Grit member) attempted to fasten the charge of immorality on Postmaster-General Haggart in connection with the leaves of absence granted lady clerks in his department, but miserably failed. Deputy Postmaster-General White furnished a satisfactory explanation. Barron sat down, vanquished. He said he did not know whether he would continue the enquiry or not, as he had not got what he expected.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

Dillon and O'Brien Warmly Congratulated.

LONDON, Aug. 5. The imperial parliament was prorogued to-day. Dillon and O'Brien appeared in the House of Commons yesterday. They received warm congratulations from both sections of the Irish party.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Aug. 5.—Anticosti—A good haul of cod and a few herring and squid at English and Fox Bays. Fair catch of herring at S. W. points. Quebec—Cod fishing good at Long Point, Magpie and Seven Island. Fair at Thunder River, Moisie, Sheldrake, Grand River, Newport Point and Paspebiac. Lance fishing good at Thunder River, Moisie, Long Points, Sheldrake and Seven Islands. New Brunswick—A few cod at Escuminac, but no mackerel at Campbells. Good catches of cod, hake, haddock, halibut, herring, large and small, and a fair quantity of mackerel. P. E. Island—No mackerel to-day at Miminigash, and only very few in the vicinity of Alberton, but a good catch reported at Malpeque. Fair haul of cod at Malpeque, and of hake at Port Hood, Cape Breton—Cod fair at Port Hood, Cheticamp and Arichat; haddock and mackerel fair at Port Hood; herring at Arichat. Mackerel dull in taking hooks at St. Peter's. Nova Scotia—Cod fishing reported poor at White Head, fair at Lunenburg and good at Liverpool. Mackerel catch at Lunenburg good. A fair quantity of squid at Port Hood, C. B., a few at Cheticamp and Arichat. Herring and small mackerel bait plentiful at Liverpool, N. S.
