WHAT THE PEOPLE SAY.

When the Governor-General was in Dawson City there was presented to him, an address by the people from which we quote the following paragraph:—

"During the year 1898 the grievances and oppression of the people of the territory became so great that it drove the population of this territory into such a state that rebellion was only prevented by the energetic persuasions on the part of the loyal British subjects residing in the Yukon territory, who pledged their word that these wrongs would be righted when and as soon as they were brought to the knowledge of the Government and Parliament of Canada, and the assurances at the time given by the loyal citizens of Her Majesty have not yet been made good and your petitioners are of the opinion that such grievances have never been known to exist in any British colony heretofore and are even worse than those which caused the dissensions in Canada in 1837 and 1885, and exceed the grievances which caused the outcry of Uitlanders of the Transvaal."

This bears out the charges of Sir Hibbert Tupper!

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Great Britain, through the agency of Lord Roberts, has now formally annexed the second of the so-called republics of South Africa. The extent of territory thus added to the Queen's Dominions is 167,465 square miles, an area about three quarters the size of that of Ontario, while the area of the colonies in South Africa is increased from 241,771 to 409,235 square miles.

—The Montreal Star reports that news that the high hand shake has been discarded—"shaken," so to speak—is given on reliable authority. It is no longer, says the Star, en regle to elevate the hand to the level of the eyebrows before "grasping the flesh" of an acquaintance. Society will now not be obliged to imagine it is dancing a minuet when it is receiving friends.

—The great success of the P. E. Island demonstrations in honor of Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Foster must have been as gall and wormwood to the Government's obedient supporters here. But the Government obtained a small measure of revenge by loading the special train going west from Summerside on Wednesday night with three cars of steel rails—some say "the old Drummond article"—and so making the progress of the passengers so slow that they did not arrive at Tignish till daylight in the morning. This exhibition of "high politics" is not likely to improve the feeling of the people of the west.

—Mr. Tarte wrote the following letter to Mr. Louis Boivin, secretary of the Jacques Cartier committee, in France:

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 7, 1900.

DEAR SIR,—Your letter of August 4th reached me in London. I leave today for Canada, and shall not return to France before the middle of October. I shall write you before hand the precise date of my return to Paris.

I have at heart the success of your patriotic project, which has also become mine since I have accepted the honorary presidency. It will be very popular in Canada, I am sure.

Since the advent of the Laurier government we have been expecting the promised boons. Were our hopes realized? Is the Island freed from debt? Do we see the fishermen in our midst shipping the fruits of their labor into the United States free of duty? Are vessels taking from our wharves the products of the soil to American ports, "Our only natural market." No! The Public Accounts tell us that our debt still grows. Time has informed us of the death of Free Trade and Tariff for Revenue. Now, day by day and month by month the rattle of the milk wagon on our streets speaks in terms more persuasive than words in praise of Conservative principles and Conservative forethought.
