 Pee Wee Reese opened the Dodger half of the first by beating out an infield hit to Tommy Glaviano. When the third baseman threw wild into the stands behind first, Reese took second. Duke Snider's single brought Reese home.
 Gil Hodges beat out an infield single to start the second inning action for Dodgers. On a hit-and-run play, Billy Cox slashed a bouncer through the spot left vacant by shortstop Marty Marion. The ball rolled to the left center-field fence for a double, scoring Hodges.
 Roe then sent an easy pop toward short left. Marion lost the ball in the strong sun. The bloop-er went for a single. George Shuba singled to score Cox.
 The Cards got their lone run in the fifth when Marion coaxed Roe's lone walk, reacted to third on Red Schoendienst' double and crossed the plate on a long fly by Del Rice.
 Johnny Lindell, bought yesterday from New York Yankees, made his first appearance for the Cards. He went hitless in four times at bat, but hit the ball well each time.
 At Boston, big John Sain turned in his second consecutive shut-out

for Boston Braves while blanking Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-0, with six hits before a chilled 10,273 crowd. Walker Cooper drove in the first run against Murry Dickson and Bob Elliott accounted for the other tallies with his sixth homer of the season.
 Philadelphia's Robin Roberts had the best of a brilliant pitching duel with Earl Blackwell as the young right-hander held Cincinnati Reds to two hits, both by Ron Northey, and pitched the Phils to a 1-0 triumph.
 The Phils made their only run in the first when scratch hits by Richie Ashburn and Gran Hamner and a walk to Eddie Waitkus loaded the bases with none out. Ashburn scored when Del Ennis hit into a double play.
 At New York, home runs by Wayne Terwilliger and Andy Pafko, each with one on in the third, gave Chicago Cubs a 4-3 triumph over New York Giants.

Germany's Hopes Dimmed For 1952 Olympics

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, May 16 (AP) — Faced with vigorous opposition from the Netherlands, the International Olympic Committee today dimmed Germany's hopes of participating in the 1952 Olympics.
 In postponing action for one year and asking the Germans to meet with the executive council this summer for further investigation, the games committee made it plain that it looks with no great favor on the application.
 Col. P. W. Scharoo of the Netherlands, a member of the executive council, was understood to have warned today's session of the I. O. C. that his country won't take part in the 1952 games if Germany is admitted.
 He was said to have named Norway, Denmark and Belgium as other countries which would withdraw rather than compete against the Germans.
 Action on Japan's application for admittance to the '52 games also was postponed for one year, though the I. O. C. reaffirmed recognition of the Japanese national Olympic committee.
 Norway persuaded the I. O. C. to give her hockey another chance in the '52 winter games at Oslo, providing the sport can satisfy the Olympic fathers it is strictly amateur.
 Hockey was banished after the 1948 games because the I. O. C. ruled that the International Federation was dominated by professionals.
 Although the Norwegians gained their point on hockey, they lost their first skirmish to include ski instructors in Olympic competition.
 In addition to skiing and hockey, the Oslo committee plans to conduct skating and bobsledding as major sports.
 In other business today, the I. O. C. picked the last week in

October and the first week in November for the 1956 summer games at Melbourne, Australia, and elected Dr. Ryutarō Azuma, 57-year-old university professor of Tokyo, to represent Japan on the committee.
