HENRY GREEN appeared at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, charged with breaking the Canada Temperance Act. It was proven that liquor had been sold in a store on King street, of which Mr. Green was supposed to be the proprietor. But he denied having anything to do in the business, and stated that he rented the store to a man named Robert Hardy, some time ago. The case was adjourned until to-morrow, in order that Green may produce evidence to prove his assertion that Hardy is the proprietor of the store in which the liquor was sold.

EXHIBITION ITEMS.—On Wednesday afternoon, as the fine P. E. Island horse "Black-foot" was being driven round the track in a sally by his driver, Mr. Donald, he became startled at something upon the track. Quite a ripple of excitement was occasioned. The driver, with admirable pluck and nerve, held the reins, and after being dragged a short distance, brought the spirited animal to a halt, without any material damage being done.

THE appearance of a lame, lank and tired horse on Water street yesterday, suggested to many the question: "Why have we not a society for the prevention of cruelty to animals?" This horse had been worked the day previous, and by accident, we will suppose, backed over Queen's wharf into a schooner, thus receiving severe injuries to a fore leg. The owner abandoned him, and he was allowed to roam at large, suffering no doubt, excruciating pain from the injuries he received in his leg. No one has yet removed him from the streets, and he still feeds off the grass along the gutters, a living monument to the owner's ingratitude. Truly the owner deserves a just punishment, but Charlottetown lacks the essential S. P. C. A.

MR. THOMAS SWERNEY, truckman, denies the charge that he backed Mr. Smith's horse over Queen's Wharf, on Wednesday last. In a letter to a city paper, which is certified as correct by three truckmen who saw the occurrence, he says: "On Tuesday Mr. F. Hayden, clerk of Mr. Bowell McGowan, contractor for supplying the Lunatic Asylum with coal, told the truckmen hauling the same that we were to have the right of loading from the schooner in preference to any one not hauling the Asylum coal. On Wednesday I was backing my cart in for a load when Mr. Richard Smith's horse and cart obstructed the way. He endeavored to back in his horse ahead of mine, and in doing so he shoved his horse and cart over the stringer of the wharf into the schooner. I positively declare that I never touched his horse until after the accident took place, and then, with the assistance of others, only to do all I could to get the horse out, whilst Smith left his horse to his fate."

PRIZES FOR GRAIN

HALIFAX, Sept. 30.

The following prizes have been awarded: Thomas Bullman, first prize for barley. Wm. Ross, 1st prize white oats; A. Boswell, 1st prize for black oats. Peter Murphy, Lot 35, 3rd prize for red wheat. Thomas Bullman, 1st prize red clover skirt timothy. Donald Ferguson, 1st prize for winter butter, second best five firkins.

Best dairy cheese, Robert Jones; second, James Howard, West River. Only two samples of Island grain did not obtain prizes.

Wm. Ross sold mare and foal to Mr. Fairweather, St. John, for two hundred and eighty dollars.

Thomas Hall, of Summerside, obtained first prize for his combined threshing and fanning mill.

Yesterday was the best day of the Exhibition. The visitors numbered twelve thousand.

The harbor was illuminated last night. It was a grand sight. The Island cattle and horses go home to-morrow.

THE HANLAN-ROSS RACE.

TORONTO, Sept. 28.

Hanlan's friends held another meeting to-night, when a despatch was read from Ross declining to row for more than \$1,000 a side. After considerable discussion it was decided to meet Ross on his own ground, so far as the matter of stake money was concerned, but Hanlan desired that Ross' articles be amended to make the contest take place on the 15th of November, instead of on the 1st as named by Ross. The articles, with this and one or two other changes—slight ones—were mailed to the New Brunswick for signature.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.

It is reported a plot to assassinate President Arthur has been discovered.

LATER.

The rumor that a plot to assassinate President Arthur has been discovered arose from a sworn statement filed in the Police Department by a man named Bayley, an attaché of the Army Medical Museum of the Surgeon General's department, to the effect that while lying in bed at his room, on Monday night, he heard two men standing in front of the house, plot the assassination of President Arthur. One asked the other if he would swear to do it; the other answered he would kill him within a month. Bayley says he saw the men as they walked off and can fully recognize them. No arrests have been made.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.

Counsel, to-day, took the last steps in the preliminary arrangements for securing the indictment of Guiteau next week, by issuing subpoenas to witnesses. On Monday morning next, at ten o'clock, a presentation of the case will be made to the Grand Jury. Guiteau's brother-in-law, who was requested by the prisoner to appear as his counsel, has not yet intimated that he will appear. Guiteau says he is not afraid of the law for that will protect him, and prevent his being hung. He is reported as feeling somewhat disappointed at not receiving a prompt reply from his brother-in-law. Little doubt exists here that his case will be presented quietly on Monday next to the Grand Jury, and that by Wednesday or Thursday that body will report in favor of his indictment for the murder of President Garfield.

LONDON, Sept. 28.

To Jas. G. Blaine, Secretary of State, Washington.— I have received a telegram from the Queen to the late President's mother, inquiring after health, as well as that of Mrs. Garfield. Her Majesty adds: "I should be thankful if you would procure me a good photograph of Gen. Garfield."

LOWELL, Minister.

Mrs. Garfield replied: "Please request Mr. Lowell to express to Her Majesty the grateful acknowledgments of the mother of General Garfield and my own for the tender, womanly sympathy she has been pleased to send; also, that Her Majesty's wishes will be complied with at an early day." ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 28.

The ferryboat running to Skidaway Islands sprung a leak, filled and sunk to-day. Twelve colored people going with marketing to Savannah were drowned; ten of them were women.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Sept. 26.

The Great Eastern handicap was won by Norton's John Ridd, War-horn second. Twenty-three ran.

The Newmarket October two-year-old plate was won by Bernard's Sing-song. At Newmarket to-day, the Ganby stakes for two-year-olds was won by Koenig's colt Golden Gate, Lefevre's Nickel second.

The Times' Dublin despatch says the liberation of Father Sheehy is not to be taken as evidence of any change of policy in regard to coercion, but as carrying out the intentions of the Government as expressed in Forster's recent letter to Givan and Dickson.

At a meeting of the Land League, Parrell announced that the executive has decided to hold a number of county conventions to acquaint the farmers and laborers with the policy decided upon at the late National Convention.

DUBLIN, Sept. 23.

Father Sheehy replying to the questions of reporters, complained of the sanitary condition of Kilmahnam Jail, which he declared was conducive to blood poisoning, and said the food was unfit for human use. He strongly condemned the Land Act.

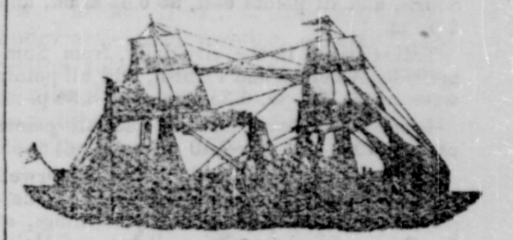
