LORD DUFFERIN has finally decided to sail by the *Polynesia* on Saturday next.

MILITIA.—The promotion of Captain and Major George Dogherty has been confirmed. We congratulate Major Dogherty.

THE wheat crop of the United States this year is estimated at 426,000 bushels, or double what it was twelve years ago in 1866, when it was 216,000 bushels.

A QUEENSTOWN dispatch of the 11th inst. says: "Four survivors of the crew of the French brig *Beauvais Noie*, of Prince Edward Island, from Havana, Sept. 2nd, for New York, have landed here."

BUTTER is likely to be low this season. The home market is well stocked, while the shipments from the United States for August alone amounted to 4,500,000 lbs., with abundance left for home consumption.

A NEW feature in the trade of the Dominion is an order from Birmingham for 105 cases, containing 2,240 dozen of wooden handles for various tools, which is being filled by the Dexter-Whitman Manufacturing Co., of St. Thomas, Ont.

THE Lieutenant Governor in Council has cancelled the following appointment: John Higgins, Collector under the "Assessment Act, 1877," for Charlottetown, Common and Royalty; and has appointed Mr. George D. Davison to that office.

At half-past nine o'clock on Saturday night, a man named Chisholm was set upon by a crowd of roughs, who assaulted him in a violent manner, and robbed him of a small sum of money. No trace of the miscreants has yet been found.

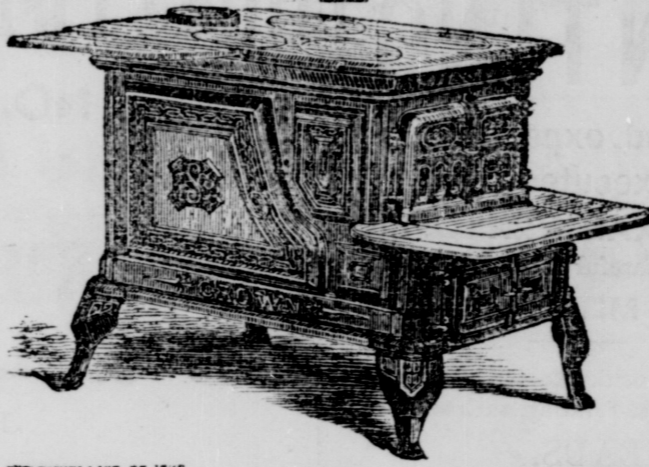
