

City town is reported As ready To amalgamate No Man's Land

 A definite move towards taking No Man's Land into the city may be taken at the special meeting of City Council tonight. City authorities now have all required information regarding the cost of supplying water to residents of the area, and may proceed under the provisions of the Municipalities Extension Act.

The Act provides the city may pass a by-law to annex the territory by a simple majority vote of the City Council, such a by-law must specify the territory to be annexed, set forth the conditions of amalgamation and decide whether the new section shall form a separate ward or be part of an existing ward.

Following this procedure by the city, it would be necessary for property owners in No Man's Land to hold a meeting and approve the proposed by-law. This must be done before final reading and passing of the by-law, and is covered by provisions for the mayor of the city calling a public hearing in the area to be annexed, not less than 60 days after the by-law is read a first time.

ACTION SOUGHT

Many property owners in the district, including a co-op housing group now completing building there, have been asking for action on the matter for some time. An active campaign was reinitiated, in a view to the amalgamation of the area into the city.

A semi-official agreement was reached at a council meeting some months ago with representatives of the district, whereby the city would make arrangements to bring city water to the area, but the building of a sewer system would wait for a future date because of the high cost involved.

In the meantime, it is believed a tax agreement will be worked out with the residents on the same basis as was following the amalgamation of the former Village of Spring Park.

Arms Talks To Recess On Sept. 8

GENEVA (AP) — Slight earthquakes tumbled a few damaged buildings Wednesday in the wake of a series of tremors that caused about 15 deaths, injured at least 60 persons and wrought heavy damage across a coast-to-coast belt of southern Italy.

But people of the affected region, though stunned and frightened by the violent disturbances, were not put off their work. In the city of Naples, the coast 150 miles away, Italians by the hundreds of thousands streamed back to jobs and homes they had fled in panic to stay outdoors through the night.

Vacationers Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy and her daughter Caroline went swimming as usual. Though their cliffside villa at Rapallo is only 45 miles southwest of the apparent epicenter of the worst quake, only slight tremors were felt in that region.

Mrs. Kennedy, wife of the U.S. president, was visiting in the garden of another villa across town at the time.

LASTS FIVE SECONDS
 The major blow shook towns and villages for five seconds, cracking walls and windows, collapsing buildings and bridges and blanching out wholesalers of the Italian peninsula because of downed power lines. Dozens of homes were destroyed.

Minor tremors occurred during the night on Wednesday morning.

Quake Area Residents Grope Back To Normal

Cracks opened in the bell tower of its 13th century Roman Catholic Cathedral.

Through the stricken area many residents huddled near a camp fire in the countryside or huddled together in parks of cars for the night. No foreigners were counted among the dead and injured.

The quakes occurred in a belt known for geological disasters. Pompeii, south of Naples, was buried by a volcanic eruption of Mount Vesuvius 1,900 years ago.

The latest quakes hit between the city of Avellino and one in 1968 took 75,000 lives at Messina.
