—O'Leary Community
Orders Projector
—There was an encouraging
turnout in the O'Leary School on
Wednesday afternoon, March 29th
to hear the results of a circular
letter sent to all Women's Insti-
tutes, Credit Unions, Young Peoples
groups etc. to subscribe \$20. Each
to purchase a Film Projector. The
meeting was addressed by Mr.
MacInnis of Charlottetown, repre-
senting the National Film Board
and his address was interesting and
informative. Mr. Errol Stetson who
has given much time to furthering
the plans for the Projector reported
that already he has 17 groups
who have signified their intention
of paying \$20. each and two other
groups were mentioned in addition.
This making 19 and only 20 groups
are needed.

—Mr. MacInnis mentioned that the
place where the projector will be
shown will be regulated by a Film
Council, which has one representa-
tive from each organization who
have contributed to the cost. The
Film Council would elect their
President, Secretary, Treasurer and
Film Librarian. Mr. MacInnis
mentioned that the N. F. B. would
loan a generator so the pictures
could be shown in communities
where there is no electricity and
they would train projectionists to
operate the machine. He mentioned
about a constitution and the follow-
ing were appointed to a Committee to
draw up a constitution for the local
group: — Errol Stetson (Chair-
man), Cyrus Gallant and Mrs. E. W.
Turner. In approximately one
month from now, when the side
roads will be in good shape, there
will be another meeting. A copy of
the constitution will be sent to
every group represented so they
can discuss it before coming to
that meeting. Mr. MacInnis said
that the projector would cost ap-
proximately \$670. (including the
screen) less a \$200. government
grant. After explaining about the
different makes of machines, it
was moved and seconded that the
group order one and Mr. MacInnis
will purchase it for the group. The
Projector will serve a wide area,
Bloomfield Corner, O'Leary, Wood-
stock, Howland, West Bedouq,
Coleman, West Cape etc. The new
Projector will serve a very real
need and will be a splendid means
of education and instruction.
