Privy Council Pays Tribute
LONDON, (CP) — The judicial committee of the Privy Council placed on record Wednesday "the sense of loss suffered by the legal systems of the Commonwealth" by the death of Sir Lyman Duff.

The former chief justice of the Supreme Court of Canada died in Ottawa Tuesday at 90. Their lordships paid tribute through Lord Radcliffe, who referred to Sir Lyman as a great lawyer singularly gifted, a distinguished member of the Privy Council for many years and master of Canadian constitutional law in both "form and spirit."

Following which he taught school in Lot 11 and then went to Boston where he worked for sometime on the Boston Elevated Railway. While in Boston he met and married Janet Weeks of Alma, P.E.I. and the family of three sons was born in that city. He lived there only for a few years and returned to Sea View where he engaged in lobster fishing combined with farming, then lobster packing. His last twenty-five years of his life he ran a general store in Sea View.

His advice was sought by many and it was given ever with the thought of what would be the best for the individual. More than one person was heard to say "Ed. Murphy will be missed in this community."

The funeral service was held on Monday, April 11th from his late residence to St. Stephen's Church conducted by Rev. Eric Ingraham. The hymns sung were "The Lord's My Shepherd," "There is No Night in Heaven," and "Till We Meet Again." Mr. Maxwell Cameron very feelingly sang "Only Remembered by What I Have Done" as a special request of the deceased. The "Masonic Service" was carried on by Bro.
