CLEARWATER, Fla., March 27 (AP) — Four members of Philadelphia Phillies were sent to the minors today and Eddie Sanicki, one of the promising members of the farm system, was decalced.

Manager Eddie Sawyer sent pitchers Andy Hansen, Steve Ridzik, and Ken Trinkle and outfielder Jack Mayo to Baltimore of

the International League. Sawyer said he recalled Sanicki for his defensive ability and sent Mayo to Baltimore because he believes the Notre Dame alumnus should have an opportunity to play daily.

Sanicki, Mayo, Ridzik and Trinkle played for Toronto last year when the International League team was a farm club of the Phils.

Cleveland Sees Good Chance For League Pennant

TUCSON, March 28 — (AP) — Cleveland Indians are high on their chances of winning the American League pennant for their new manager, Al Lopez.

They feel that only a fluke — four straight losses to St. Louis Browns — deprived them of the flag last year, and they feel they have added sufficient batting punch to forestall such a disaster this time.

They haven't a lefthander on their starting staff, but profess no concern. They'll take Lemon (Bob), by common consent the best pitcher in the game today, and his three fellow right-handers — Bob Feller, Mike Garcia and Early Wynn.

Lopez himself says it is a question of beating out the champion Yankees. He doesn't appear to stand in awe of Boston Red Sox.

The team, after looking like a winner three or four weeks from last season's close, hit the rocks and finally wound up fourth.

The Indians like their new key-stone combination of Ray Boone at short and Roberto Avila at second.

Avila, from Vera Cruz, Mexico, hit 200 in 80 games as Joe Gordon's understudy last year. Boone hit 301 in 109 games, but between them they hit only eight home runs.

The Indians have brought up two great-looking Negro outfielders from their San Diego farm. Harry (Sultcase) Simpson was the sensation of the first weeks of training, but lately he has had to take a rear seat to Orestes Minoso, a Cuban ball buster. Minoso hits them a mile.

With Larry Doby firmly established in centre field — 326 last year, with 26 home runs and 102 runs batted in — Lopez is faced with the prospect of starting the first all-Negro outfield in major league history if both Minoso and Simpson deliver.

Luke Easter, the Tribe's big Negro first baseman, is recovering fast from an injury to his glove arm which kept him out of action several weeks. Luke pounded 28 homers as a freshman last year and drove in 107 runs.

Al Rosen, whose 37 homers led the American League last season, can be expected to have another big year at third base. The veteran Birdie Tebbets, obtained from Boston during the winter to back up Jim Hegan, guarantees the Tribe good catching.

Steve Gromek, 10-7 last year, shapes up as the fifth starter on the pitching staff. Sam Zolcak is their lone lefty.

This has resulted in a lowering of prices and operators of grading stations are now quoting producers for ungraded eggs, Grade A Large 44; Grade A Medium 42; Grade A Pullet and B 38; Grade C 28.

Wholesalers are quoting for the graded pack f.o.b. station: Grade A Large 48; Grade A Medium 46; Grade A Pullet and B 42; Grade C 31.

Wholesalers quoting retailers for graded pack: Grade A Large 51; Grade A Medium 49; Grade A Pullet and B 45; Grade C 34.
