FARMERS UNDER FREE TRADE.

Proof accumulates that the farmers of Great Britain are suffering heavily on account of the unhampered competition of foreign countries.

It is useless to talk of railway rates, light railways or division of rates, etc.—these are only palliatives.

So heavy is the depression of the agricultural interest in Great Britain that Lord Salisbury was constrained to refer to it in the course of his speech delivered at Walford on Wednesday last.

Since the repeal of the corn laws we have had the strongest cause to lament that, though the protectionists resisted, their warnings have not been listened to more carefully.

The farmers of Canada have now as much as they can struggle against. Just think of their position to-day if they were subject to the same Free Trade System as that of Great Britain.

It seems to us that the measure to be promoted for the relief of farmers in Great Britain and the British Colonies alike is that of Imperial Reciprocity—a British trade union—as against the competition of foreign and commercially hostile nations.

BY-ELECTIONS.

There are now vacancies in the representation of West Huron, Jacques Cartier, the Central Division of Montreal, and Cardwell. It seems to be likely that a vacancy will be created in Mississippi.

There are many signs that Mr. Chamberlain has made up his mind to signalize his reign in the Colonial Office by a vigorous policy, which will be felt in many quarters.

MR. WHITE'S RESIGNATION.

Mr. R. S. WHITE has given his reasons for his resignation of the seat he occupied in the House of Commons. It appears that on the occasion of the election of 1891, Mr. White gave the electors of Cardwell a distinct pledge that he would withdraw his confidence from the Government in the event of the then recently enacted school legislation of Manitoba being made the subject of disallowance by the Dominion Government.

As to the Collectorship of Montreal Mr. White says: "Inasmuch as an impression has prevailed somewhat widely, that the delay in filling the office was due to a reluctance on the part of the Government to submit their policy to the judgment of the electors of Cardwell, by selecting myself for the vacancy, I decided without solicitation on the part of the Cabinet, and without intimation of my purpose to any of its members, to resign that impression, so far as I could, by resigning the representation of the county of my own accord."

It is not to be inferred that Mr. White disapproves of the course pursued by the Government in respect to the Manitoba Schools. He declares, further, that though the Conservative party has lost three of its leaders, the principles of the party survive, and it is his confident hope that Cardwell will prove, in the pending election, as true to those principles as she has ever done in the past.

The less of Mr. White's services in Parliament will be greatly regretted by all who care for the wise and prudent conduct of public affairs. High-minded and honorable, as well as able, men are needed in the councils of our great and growing nationality.

HOW THE BATTLE IS TO BE WON.

The chief organ of the Liberal party in Quebec explains the grounds upon which the confident predictions that the Liberals will achieve a glorious victory in the next general election are based. L'Electeur says that the Roman Catholic clergy will not support Sir Mackenzie Bowell. The Catholics of Ontario will, it says, vote for Mr. Laurier's candidates in the next contest.

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NOTES AND COMMENTS.

According to the Montreal Star, "Mr. Laurier has been pretty persistently practised during his Ontario tour in the high art of answering questions in such a way as to give a maximum of satisfaction with a minimum of information."

It is stated at the Russian embassy in London that a telegram was received some days ago from Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky, the Russian foreign minister, declaring that the report that a secret treaty had been concluded between Russia and China is unfounded.

An Auckland, New Zealand, despatch states that the agreement entered into by Mr. Huddart and the treasury of that colony, for a monthly mail service between New Zealand and Vancouver, has been laid on the table in the Assembly for ratification.

Mail and Empire: Having got out of the rural districts and into the precincts of manufacturing industry, Mr. Laurier is willing to sacrifice all the farmers in the country to make himself solid in the tall chimney chimneys. In his policy the principle of free trade still holds good for farm products, but as for the manufacturer of strictly finished products, he does not think it enough to agree with Mr. Sailer and Mr. Hyman that they should continue to have protection along with this advantage he insists on throwing in free raw material.

Increase of Revenue in Italy. Rome, Oct. 30.—It is officially announced that the national revenue for 1895 amounts to 21,000 lire above that of 1894.

Turkey Will be Held Responsible. WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Minister Terrell cables the state department from Constantinople that he warned the Porte that Turkey would be held responsible for the safety of every American missionary.

A Cuban Rebel General Resigns. HAVANA, October 30.—A despatch from Puerto Principe says it is reported there that General Maximo Gomez, commander in chief of the insurgents, has resigned the command, and will leave the island for the purpose of having wounds in his legs cured.

Claims the Island of Trinidad. WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The British ambassador had an unexpected visitor today in the person of Count de La Boissere, who, as the so-called grand chancellor, represents the claims of Harden-Hickey, known as Baron Harden-Hickey, to the island of Trinidad, off the coast of Brazil.

A Disastrous Fire. A fire in West Park, Tuesday, 5th, Nov. 1, has here, resulted in the loss of three lives and made two families homeless. The loss is \$50,000. Among the dead are Mrs. T. Knowles, 50 years of age, and her two daughters, 29 and 13 years of age respectively.

A Great Costumer Dead. LONDON, Nov. 1. Peter Robinson, the great costumer and shop-keeper of London, is dead.

P. E. Island's Lobster Pack. OTTAWA, Nov. 1. The total pack of lobsters for P. E. Island this year is 3,991,000 one pound cans, a decrease of 70,000 compared with last year.

Hugh McMillan Dead. MONTREAL, Nov. 1. Hugh McMillan, ex-M.P. for Vaudreuil, is dead.
