P. E. ISLANDERS IN THE KLONDYKE.

An Account of Three Natives of the Province, now Located at Eldorado.



The illustration above is from a photograph lately forwarded from the Klondyke. The first figure on the right will be probably the most readily recognized. It is Mr. George A. Dixon, formerly well-known in Charlottetown, who conducted a merchant tailoring business for some years in this city. The man standing next to him is Edward Lydiard who is a son of the late Edward Lydiard, for years connected with H. M. Customs in this city, and who was well known to a host of our older people. Ned, as he was called by the boys who used to know him, is hardly recognizable owing to the beard he has grown. The two next figure are sturdy enough for P. E. Islanders though we are not sure that they hail from this province. On the end of the line is Ernest Joy, son of Mr. John P. Joy, of Charlottetown. These men are in partnership in the hunt for gold in the cold and inhospitable Klondyke. Their cabin, which is plainly shown in the picture, is not a very luxurious looking abode, but, compared with some of the contrivances in which men live in that country it is quite a palace. Its occupants certainly look as happy and robust as if they dwelt in marble halls. Of the three we have mentioned Dixon was the first to go out to the Klondyke. He left Charlottetown in January, 1898, when the great rush for the gold fields

was on. He has tried his luck at many times since his arrival there, having staked eleven claims at different times and worked them all with poor success. But hard luck, it is reported, has given away before pluck and perseverance. It is understood that his chances of getting a good "haul" out of his present claim are fairly good. It is to be hoped that fortune will favor him. Mr. Dixon is a native of North River and is very well known in P. E. Island. Lydiard turned up in Dawson City in March, 1898, coming there from the United States where previously he had been living for some years. The "rush" brought him and it brought so many adventurous Islanders and the feeling of "like for like" drifted him finally into partnership with Dixon. Ernest Joy is the youngest in the group. He is only nineteen years old, but is working his way with a determination to succeed that should bring its own reward. We have at different times published letters from Mr. Dixon describing his trip out and containing graphic accounts of his experiences in the gold regions. The cabin above is called the Dixon and Lydiard cabin, and is quite close to their present claim which is situated, we understand, on Eldorado Creek.

NEW BUILDINGS AT SUSSEX.—An exchange says that six large and costly brick buildings are being built at Sussex, N. B., at the present time, among them being the new Depot house and the building for the Bank of Nova Scotia, each of which will, it is estimated, cost \$20,000 when completed.

A DISTRICT UNION.—A District Union of the Provincial Sunday School Union was organized at Eldon a day or two ago, by Rev D. B. In the evening a public meeting was held, at which able and interesting addresses were delivered bearing upon Sunday School work.

POLICE COURT.—This morning George Donovan appeared before His Honor on two charges. For drunkenness he was fined \$5 or 30 days, and for stealing plates from Monaghan's auction room he was sentenced to one month's imprisonment with hard labor. John Smith and William Smith, charged with larceny on complaint of W. A. Hutcheson, were discharged. Samuel Morrison, for assaulting Henry McAleer, was fined 5 cents and costs, the prosecutor not appearing.

HOPE RIVER TEA.—The Tea at Hope River yesterday was one of the most successful ever held at that place. The day was an ideal one for such an outing, and there was a large attendance, including many from Charlottetown. The tea and other tables were well supplied. Dancing, swinging and other amusements were provided. The proceeds amount to \$800. The cake presented by Driscoll & Hornsby brought \$33.80.

Alfred Roy, a resident of St. Joseph's College, was celebrated by the people of Memramcook to-day with great enthusiasm. High Mass was celebrated in the parish church, and a large distinguished company sat down to a banquet in the college dining hall. Addresses in French and English were presented by parishioners, accompanied by a purse containing \$250 in gold. Father Roy is a native of St. Lambert, near Montreal, but was for 19 years a member of the faculty of St. Joseph's, and an intimate friend and advisor of the late Father Lefebvre, by whom the college was founded.
