Brazil Drops Canada From North American Zone Play

MONTREAL (CP) — Brazil ousted Canada from North American zone play for the Davis Cup Sunday when young Carlos Fernandez whipped Don Fontana of Toronto 6-3, 6-3, 10-8 to give his Country its third win the best-of-five first-round tie.

The 19-year-old Brazilian tennis star had little trouble with Fontana in the first two sets. His win was a personal triumph since he beat Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., in the opening singles match Friday and teamed with team-mate Armando Vieira to beat Paul Willey of Vancouver and Fontana in the doubles Saturday.

Canada had one victory in the best-of-five event, Fontana's five-set upset of Vieira in Friday's second singles match.

Fernandez' victory over Fontana reduced Sunday's second singles event and final match of the tie to the status of an exhibition.

Brazil takes on Israel in the second round here next weekend. The grass courts at the Mount-Royal Tennis Club worn and yellowed by two days play, were made slippery by a light rain that fell before the start of Sunday's Fernandez-Fontana match. A brief sprinkle fell just after the match began.

IMPOSSIBLE SHOTS
Fernandez, always eager, sped from end of the court to the other during Sunday's first singles, returning almost-impossible shots. Fontana had trouble returning the Brazilian's powerful serve and more trouble getting his own into the court. He was scored four times. Fontana's own errors helped to beat him. He put the ball out 15 times in the first set compared to four outs by Fernandez.

The math and the point was set up when Fontana drove the ball out in making a return. Fernandez then forced him into an out off the first serve to win it all.

When he was not committing errors, Fontana appeared to outplay Fernandez. He displayed an excellent cross-court volley from the net and counted heavily on overhead smashes.

Fernandez relied mainly on his overhead and on a fast forehand passing shot. In the third set, af-

ter five games, Fernandez switched to using short hop shots from the net to throw Fontana off balance.

He and Fontana looked almost even until the eighth game of the first set, when Fernandez broke through Fontana's serve. Fontana netted one and put the ball out one, then netted the game point.

TRIED HARD
Fontana tried hard to break back in the ninth, and carried the game to four deuces before Fernandez took the advantage on an overhead smash, then blasted a serve too hard for Fontana to handle.

Fontana lost the second set when he allowed Fernandez to break his service in the vital ninth game. Fontana outted on the point before set and on set point.

The Canadian and Fernandez struggled on almost even terms through the third set, each winning his own service until Fernandez broke through in the 18th game to win.

In Saturdays action Canadian non-playing Captain Gordie Meneleto elected to rest ace Bedard, who was sapped by Friday's grueling battle in high temperatures, and went along with Fontana and Willey.

It backfired. In an error-filled game, the Canadians lost in four sets 6-6, 6-2, 7-9, 6-4 as the Brazilians outstayed them. The Canadians had played together only one before and omitted errors all over the court.
