A NEW INDUSTRY.—The Hantsport, N. S. Advance says: We have heard of people drying the plumage of fowls to prepare a joking article, they were once foreign bred, but drying the skin of dressed fowls is altogether a new industry. Last week a lady in town purchased a pair of nice-looking, yellow-skinned, dressed fowls. What was her surprise, when she came to wash them for the oven, the yellow color all left the fowls and mixed with the water. The fowls had been white skinned, but had been colored yellow by some thrifty housewife in order that she might obtain a few cents more for the pair.

WITHOUT A HOME.—A lad about 12 years of age who gives his name as John Henry Robertson, was found wandering about the streets last night by officer Taylor and taken to the police station. The lad was poorly clad, but since his arrest some articles of clothing have been obtained for him. Young Robertson says his mother is dead and his father has deserted him. He had been starting with some people in the country, but he says they were not good to him and he left. He will be sent to the poor house until a home is found for him.

THE RAINFALL.—A gentleman with a meteorological disposition says that from September 17th to November 12th, a period of 57 days, there were 33 days in which we had rain continuously or some time during the 24 hours. This left 23 dry days between those dates, or on an average 55 per cent. of wet weather. From September 17th to 20th there were seven wet days, an average of over 50 per cent., while from October 1st to November 12th rain descended 23 out of the 43 days, or on an average of over 60 per cent. wet. It is agreed on all sides that for the past 40 years, at least, such a wet autumn has not been experienced in this province.—Farmer.

NOTES OF SHIPPING.—The schr. W. R. Huntley is to sail to-day from Summerside for Danvers. She takes 2,500 sacks white oats, 130 crates potatoes, a quantity of carrots, lobsters, cheese, etc., and a deck load consisting of 18 hampers, 50 sheep, 4 cows, pigs, ducks, chickens, turkeys, etc. Messrs. Rogers, Green and Montgomery and Captain Barnard are the shippers. The cargo of the Fastnet sailing from Charlottetown to-day includes 700 boxes of cheese and 50 boxes of butter, the former being shipped by Mr. Polimore and the latter by Mr. Dillon. The butter and cheese is for the London and Liverpool markets. Part of the cargo of the Northumberland yesterday consisted of 215 lambs and sheep, shipped to John Kane, St. John, by Mr. John McDougall, of O'Leary. Fifteen horses were shipped by Athol, N. S. yesterday, by Mr. W. S. McKie, of this city.

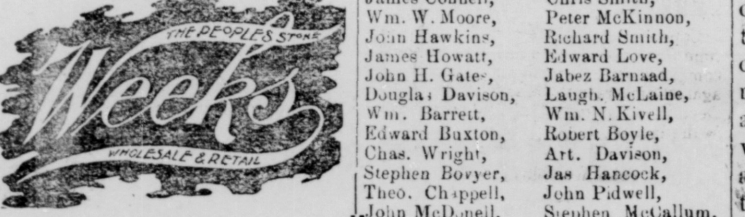

In Toronto oats are reported by the Globe to be steady at 20c for mixed and 21 to 21 1/2 for white west. Montreal quotations are 25 1/2 to 26 1/2. Pork.—There has been a good supply of pork through the price continues to be as low as 21c to 41c by the carcass. The Montreal quotations are: Canadian pork, new, \$11.00 to \$12.00 Canadian short-cut, clear 10.00 to 10.25 Canadian short-cut, mixed 10.25 to 10.50 Hams, city cured, per lb 0.09 to 0.10 Lard, Canadian, in pails 0.07 to 0.07 1/2 Bacon, per lb, 0.08 to 0.08 1/2 Lard, com. refined, lb., 0.51 to 0.51 1/2. Latest advices from Liverpool, G. B., report no change there in the provision market. Pork (loaf), 50; lard, 2's, bacon, 24 1/2 to 25 1/2; and tallow, 20s 6d. Butter.—Montreal advices state that ordinary butter sells at 18 1/2 to 19 1/2 cents for Western dairy. Cheese.—Latest advices from Montreal report cheese at 9 1/2 to 10 1/2 cents per lb.
