CONTRACT BRIDGE

With 10 to 14 points the responder jumps to three notrump because he is assured the partnership has at least 26 points and cannot be in the slam zone (which requires 33 points).

North's jump to three notrump may appear to be a violation of the requirements, but it is not. North has only 9 points in high cards, but additional credit must be given for the five-card suit as well as the tens and nines which may come into service. In fact, North's hand is better than the average run of 10-point hands.

Declarer won the club lead, with the queen and had to make only one cautious move to guarantee the contract. He led back a low heart, and when dummy's ten held the trick, he returned to his hand with a spade and took a diamond finesse. This is lost, but South had his nine tricks salted away.

Without the heart play first, declarer would have gone down. He would have lost to East and a club return would have held south to eight tricks.

The danger in this hand is that West has a long club suit, and the ace of hearts. To protect against this possibility, West's potential heart entry is attacked at once. If West passes up the heart, diamonds are tackled. If West takes the heart, his dangerous club suit cannot score because of lack of an entry.

Price Squeeze On Farmers Threatens Food Production

ROME (CP) — An increasing price squeeze on the farmer threatens to check the rise in food production in a world that still knows widespread hunger.

B. R. Sen, Indian director general of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, gave that warning Monday in

FAO's 1957 world survey. The group also told of a trend toward inflation in many countries, and said that although famine has been conquered, half mankind is still underfed.

The FAO report said that although the prices paid to the farmer for his produce had increased somewhat in the last year — mostly because of government supporters — it did not match the higher prices the farmer had to pay for what he bought.

World agricultural production in 1956-57 again kept slightly ahead of the world's increase in population as it has for the last four years, FAO reported.

World trade in agricultural products increased last year, but the average values of these exports continued to shrink in comparison with manufactured goods, catching the world's primarily agricultural countries in a price squeeze.

For the first time the FAO report included official statistics provided by the Soviet Union. They reveal that the once-barren wastelands of Siberia have replaced the Ukraine as Russia's breadbasket, and despite its vast farmlands Russia is still a big importer of American grown food.

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Test Nears At Little Rock

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — The federal government, moving with Arkansas Governor Orval Faubus, drew up a list of some 200 witnesses Tuesday for Friday's court hearing on his use of armed troops to block integration in a Little Rock high school.

Advice and appeals swept in on Faubus as the zero hour neared. He conferred twice with Representative Brooks Hays (Dem. Ark.), who is trying to find a formula for ending the powder-racial struggle in Little Rock.

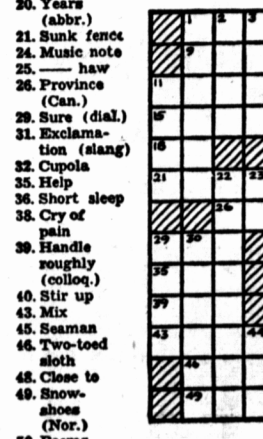
While they were talking, Mayor Woodrow Wilson Mann urgently appealed to Faubus to take guardsmen from Central High School where the soldiers have stood — with orders to bar Negroes — since the night of Sept. 2.

Faubus has been summoned to appear Friday morning before U.S. district Judge Ronald N. Davies. The government is asking for a preliminary injunction to end Faubus' blockade of Negro students.

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The A.F.L. California Federation of Labor in a resolution Tuesday called on President Eisenhower to "take immediate and positive action" in the Little Rock school integration crisis.

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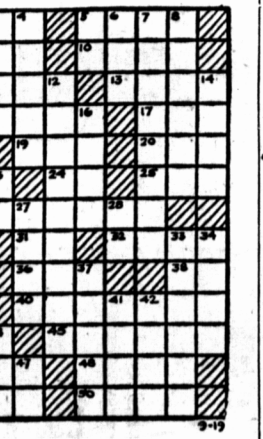

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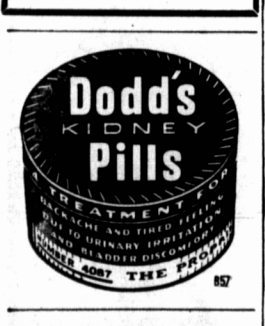
