(Federation of Agriculture News)

"OPERATION POTATO"

One of the prime purposes in forming the Federation of Agriculture was that of giving the farmer the opportunity of expressing himself as an organization in a public way and to also, through a variety of mediums, bring to him information on problems which might affect his social and economic position.

During last spring's plebiscite campaign, the Federation through public meetings, provided both opponents and supporters of the Potato Board the opportunity of stating their respective views on the issues involved. The Federation is not a closed shop which permits only one side of a question to be presented. Basically, the directors and officers of the Federation believe that the individual farmer, if given information on any problem, has the ability and judgement to arrive at a reasonable decision.

Admittedly, the Potato Marketing Board, which was sustained last spring by a vote of the majority of producers, now finds itself in a contentious position in its endeavours to safe-guard the interests of the rank and file of potato growers. Realizing this fact, the Federation has decided to sponsor on September 29, in the Charlottetown Forum, a mass meeting of potato producers. This meeting will provide the Potato Marketing Board through its Chairman and Manager, the opportunity of stating the reasons which impelled it to the conclusions reached in the marketing policy agreed to on September 7th. The meeting will also provide those who do not believe in the announced policy the opportunity of stating their opinions.

This meeting, if largely attended, may prove well to be an excellent barometer of public opinion on this question, and every grower who plans to market potatoes this year should, in his own interests, attend.

Attendance will indicate his conception of his own business and his reaction guide those most concerned officially in the present controversy.

THE PROVINCE'S FUTURE

Prince Edward Island is generally conceded to be, from an agricultural standpoint, endowed with many advantages. The people are reputed to be industrious, frugal and in the majority excellent farmers. With two such important advantages, the progress of the province would be almost taken for granted, but nevertheless this progress does not appear to have in any sense reached what might be considered easily possible. Abandoned or unoccupied farms and many more producing at a low level bear testimony to the fact that our most important and valuable natural resource is not being used to the fullest extent. Why then, with thousands of farms producing at a reasonable level, should there be hundreds that are producing little or nothing and constituting a liability to the communities where they are located?

Some years ago Dr. Lattimer remarked that farming has always been full of promise, promises which in large part were never fulfilled. The future belongs to those who prepare for it, and we would suggest that the agricultural future of this province, while it may depend to a certain extent upon the individual efforts of its farm people, depends to a far greater extent upon the ability of those farmers to exert their energies and activities in a collective way, through organized effort.

Speakers and writers, who paint in glowing terms the virtues and strength of rugged individualism, must realize that the world and agriculture are faced today with problems that will never be solved by thousands or millions of individuals, and acting only as individuals. While we may praise the rare individual who, through force of character and extraordinary ability rises to a preferred position, yet we cannot forget that this rise may have taken place at the cost of many people well endowed to render outstanding service to their state, if given reasonable opportunity.

No army or no large group of industrial workers can act in an efficient way unless their work is

planned and directed intelligently. The dawning realization of the part of farmers, and of other groups and professions, Government and other groups must realize their responsibilities in encouraging and promoting group action by farm people, action which the intelligent realize is the great hope of the province, rather than the great menace which apparently some believe it to be.

THEOPHILUS W. DOULL

A wide circle of friends will learn with regret of the death of Mr. Theophilus Wesley Doull which occurred at his home last week at Dominion Park, Lancaster, N. B., after a lengthy period of failing health.

Mr. Doull was born in Sackville in 1885, a son of J. Wesley Doull, Saskatoon, and the late Mrs. Gertrude E. (Touse) Doull of Sackville. He came to Saint John in 1929 and lived in the city until 1938 when he moved to Lancaster. Before his retirement in 1946, Mr. Doull was employed for 18 years with the wood-working firm of Murray and Gregory Ltd.

He was a member of the West Side Kirk and elder of the church. For several years, belonged to Carleton Union Lodge, No. 8 F. and A.M. and before his illness was active in young people's work.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mary H. Bean of Blackville, one son, Murray W. Lancaster; two daughters, Mrs. M. MacLaren Roberts, Saint John and Mrs. John A. Savory, Toronto, Ont., his father in Saskatchewan, who celebrated his 105th birthday, Sept. 18, one brother, Fred Doull, Vancouver, B. The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon from the West Side Kirk. Interment was in the Cedar Hill Cemetery.
