Blame Water For Illness At Bathurst, N. B.

BATHURST, N. B. (CP)—Scores of Bathurst residents are ill with a form of intestinal flu whose origin has been attributed by some to a contaminated water supply. A doctor, confirming reports of the widespread illness, said source of the sickness might be the water used in Bathurst homes. Victims of the sickness "feel awfully bad when they have it, but they don't die and usually recover in a day or two," the doctor said. He preferred not to be identified. Climax in the number of cases may have been reached Wednesday and Thursday, he said. Mrs. Meale Smith, wife of the town's mayor, said in his absence, that she knew of a dozen or more persons affected Thursday. Mrs. Smith said she and her small daughter were ill Wednesday. One report said the source of the contamination was a dead mouse in Middle river, from which Bathurst draws its water. The report was not confirmed. The doctor said the illness has been prevalent in other sections of the district.
