

Fishery Problems Aired At Federation Meeting

the dinner meeting was Mr. A.W. Fralick, Field Inspection Officer of the Maritime Area, Dominion Department of Fisheries. A resolution was passed stating "Restriction of bank credit by the

Central Bank is detrimental to basic industries (like fishing) in this Province."

"Fish landings in Canada last year totalled 2,367,000,000 pounds valued at \$42,500,000 to the fishermen," Mr. Fralick said in the course of his address. "In the Atlantic Provinces we must go all out on quality if we are to stay in business. We are in competition with other countries and are only fooling ourselves if we think otherwise."

Mr. Fralick spoke of the large fleet of fishing vessels sailing out of Lunenburg at the turn of the century and up to 1919 when the schooners began to adopt power to replace sails. There were 117 vessels sailing out of Lunenburg bound for the Grand Banks areas in 1915 while this year there were only nine ships making that town the home port and 13 registered from Newfoundland, all motor propelled. The casualties in the sailing days were very large each year with 1926 standing out as a record of catastrophes when six Lunenburg ships were lost on the Grand Banks with all hands on board.

Six species of fish brought over a million dollars in the catch of each kind to the fishermen of the Atlantic Provinces last year while many other species found a ready market in lesser quantities. Dealing in detail the different types of fish and the best market for the same, he touched on the development of the swordfish business which in the past 25 years has reached the point where 120 boats are fishing from April until the late fall, following the schools from off the Maine coast and off the Nova Scotia coast clear to the Grand Banks. Coast year to the Grand Banks. Scallop fishery until now there are 26 boats fishing out of Digby and 16 larger ones in another fleet, engaged in this work. Alwelves are finding a ready market in processing cat and dog foods.

Mr. Fralick also spoke of the great advances made by Russia in the development of the fishing industry. He was thanked for his address by Mr. J.B. Myrick of Tignish.

Two visitors Mr. Wong Chew Onn and his son George who flew from Jamaica to Halifax a few days ago and arrived in Charlottetown by air yesterday morning, were much impressed by what they heard at the meeting, at the meeting of the day. They have been the agents of J.W. Windsor Co. Ltd. at Kingston, Jamaica for many years.

In submitting his annual report, President Burhoe referred to the groundfish restrictions on imports to the United States as giving trouble enough in an otherwise quiet year. The situation continues to be serious and calls for continued support, in urging the removal of restrictions.

The report touched on several matters of importance to the industry, and particularly the unemployment insurance situation. "We can pride ourselves in being the first to promote the idea of unemployment insurance for fishermen," Mr. Burhoe said. "While actual details are yet to be announced, we are pleased to say that a promise has been made through the council that the industry's views will be asked. We should give some thought to this matter so that no unwelcome regulations get in or those which will penalize some segment."

Police Report Little Damage in Charlottetown

Hallowe'en, with all its costumes, gaiety and pranks, has come and gone again. And much to the pleasure of the Law and property owners, the trend of recent years continued and another moderation of the pranksters' "bags of tricks" was evident in last night's activities.

Nonsense of the kiddies was greatly curtailed by the many Hallowe'en parties sponsored by the different clubs and organizations of Charlottetown.

The report from City Police Headquarters late last night that damage in Charlottetown was negligible is only a small indication of the fine work produced by Police Chief MacArthur and his force. Only a very few windows and lights were damaged and the destructors in most cases were caught by members of the force.

The Chief, in preparation for the night, divided the city into 10 sections and places a car with two men on patrol in each of the districts. Two extra cars were also at work. Along with this he had 8 men walking the main disturbance areas.

The Brighton region proved to be the most bothersome, with hundreds of pranksters congregating at that point. The only evidence of their work was several road blocks.

The R.C.M.P. reported at midnight that very little had been done in the line of serious damage to that point but that their busiest period would be the three hours following 12 o'clock.

Lady Dundee Finds Canadians Much Occupied

TORONTO (CP)—Canadian teen-agers have Lady Dundee guessing.

The attractive wife of the Earl of Dundee says she finds it difficult to guess the ages of teenagers here. The earl is on a two-month speaking tour of Canada and the United States.

"They seem to be more finished—a little more sophisticated than those in Scotland," she said. A mother of five, two boys and three girls, she is adequately qualified to draw comparisons.

"Perhaps our teen-agers are more reserved," she said in an interview. "Girls here are more open. They appear to be much more grown-up, particularly in their dress."

Looking elegant in a light-weight, charcoal-grey checked suit, Lady Dundee said that although she has been here only a week she has already formed an impression of Canadians.

"They all seem terribly occupied. They seem to be so interested in life with not much time to waste."

But whatever their preoccupations, Canadians are friendly.

"You have that reputation but one never knows about these things until you find out for yourself," she said.

"That Canadians live up to their billing pleases her.

"I like people who are interested in lots of things," she said. "I think they are much more entertaining all around than people who know a lot about one thing but not much of anything else."

POLIO IMMUNIZATION Clinics conducted by the Health Department will be held in most of the rural schools during the next three weeks, or in regional centres.
