



Canadiens Defeat N.Y. Rangers By 7-1 Score

NEW YORK (CP)—The league-leading Montreal Canadiens fired in three goals in 31 seconds in the third period Sunday night to clinch a 7-1 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers.

The fastest three goal spurt on record was on March 23, 1952 when Chicago Black Hawks' Bill Mosienko netted three times within 21 seconds against the Rangers.

In all Montreal scored five times during the final period after taking a 2-1 lead midway in the opening frame.

Jackie Leclair led the scoring parade with two goals. Doug Harvey, Dickie Moore, Butch Bouchard, Floyd Curry and Maurice Richard accounting for the other five.

Aldo Guidolin notched the sole Ranger tally in the first period. Moore opened the final scoring outburst at 9:40. Leclair netted 18 seconds later and Bouchard scored his first goal of the season at 10:11.

Curry made it four goals within two minutes 59 seconds at 12:39. The fastest four goals on record were made in two minutes and 10 seconds by the Rangers against Chicago on March 12, 1952.

TORONTO (CP)—Centre Ted Kennedy scored with less than two minutes remaining in the game Saturday night to give the Toronto Maple Leafs a 1-1 National Hockey League tie with Detroit Red Wings before 13,284 fans.

The 29-year-old forward sent the lively, free-wheeling engagement into a deadlock at 18:18 when he picked up a trailer pass from defenseman Tim Horton and beat goaltender Terry Sawchuk with a flip shot.

Until then, the second-place Red Wings appeared headed for their 34th victory of the 1954-55 campaign. They were riding strong on a 1-0 lead produced by left-winger Marcel Bonin at 3:27 of the third session.

Penticton Vs Keep Pace With Russians As Both Post Shut-outs In Yesterday's Games

COLOGNE, Germany (CP)—Playing coach Grant Warwick of Penticton Vs got into a fight and a Czech and a Russian engaged in a kicking bout as favored Canada and the Soviet Union continued their domination of the world hockey tournament Sunday night with easy shutout victories over Poland and Czechoslovakia.

The Canadians and Russians, the last unbeaten teams in the nine-country tournament, were tied for first place, each with three victories. And from the way the rest of the schedule shapes up, the world title probably will not be decided until the two giants meet on the final day next Sunday.

Penticton Vs blanked Poland 8-0 in a dull but rugged game that was anything but polite at Cologne's big outdoor Eisstadion. Only about 1,500 fans watched in bitter cold as Jack McIntyre, one of the team's best playmakers, scored three goals and assisted on another.

The Russians whitewashed the satellite Czechs 4-0 in a game that was anything but polite at Krefeld's indoor Rheinland-halle. About 5,000 Germans cheered wildly for the Czechs and booed whenever a Russian committed a foul.

SCORE SECOND WINS
The United States and Sweden each scored their second victories against one loss to move into a tie for third place. The Americans whipped Germany 6-3 after taking a 5-0 lead early in the second period and Sweden ran over Switzerland 10-0.

The Swiss haven't yet scored a goal in the tournament. The Canadians, who had their hands full in trimming the Czechs 5-3 Saturday night, played rather sluggish hockey against the Poles and seemed to have trouble with their skates and the ice surface.

They depended mostly on their power plays to score three goals in the first period, three more in the second and two in the finale.

The Poles were game and tried to match the Canadians in ruggedness, but they had little else to offer and what few chances they had to score they missed by ineffectual shooting.

Ten of the 11 penalties called were in the last two periods and the Canadians for a change didn't get a majority of them.

FIRST FIGHT
Grant Warwick, who reprimanded his players Saturday night for getting too many penalties against the Czechs, got into a fist fight himself Saturday night in the third period with Polish defenceman Kazimierz Chodkowski although the Canadian didn't appear to start it.

Warwick's tussle with Chodkowski was tame compared to the battle in the last 10 minutes of the Soviet-Czech game.

The Russians had the game sewed up when the kicking session developed. Russia's Victor Shuvolov booted Czech defenceman Jan Lidra who surprised the Russian by kicking him right back.

Russia's team captain, Vsevolod Bobrov, entered the fray and started punching Lidra.

Two German referees restored order and sent Bobrov off with a major while the Czech drew two minutes.

Coach Warwick and McIntyre were the handiest of Canada's players with their brilliant stick-handling in accounting for five of the eight goals.

"The Rocket" (Richard) would kill those guys," said the coach in the subdued dressing room atmosphere. He had no comment on the fight but said briefly: "We are having trouble with our skate sharpening."

Other players, including Bill Warwick who went scoreless for the first time in the tournament, complained about their skates and the Canadians seemed to fall a lot.

The league held its most recent meeting to final all the little left-overs of the regular season and decide on the play-off plan at the Windsor Hotel in Moncton Saturday afternoon. Team manager Forrest Clow represented the Islanders at the parley with Farley and his boys.

Farley and his boys' Forest returned to the city later in the week-end and came down to the office last evening and discussed the happenings of the meeting with the writer. Mr. Clow presented the Islanders proposal for the play-off dates and the league proposed a plan that the first two games be played on the Forum ice Monday and Tuesday of this week. The teams would then move to Moncton for the third and fourth matches on Thursday and Friday and the fifth in the Hub City on Saturday. The sixth and seventh games, if necessary, would be played at Charlottetown on Monday and Tuesday of the following week, thus allowing the Maritime finals to commence on their scheduled date of Wednesday, March 2.

It appears that the Moncton Stadium is rented to an ice show on Thursday and Friday of this week and so the Hawks claimed that this proposal would not suit them and they requested that the four games be played the first week and three the second. Mr. Clow rejected this and came up with the second proposal that the first and second games be played on the island Monday and Tuesday and the third game at Moncton on Wednesday when their ice is free, the fourth on Moncton ice on Saturday. The Hawks refused to agree to Mr. Clow's proposal and the case was handed to the league for arbitration. Mr. Parlee came up with the idea that the Hawks had proposed and so we have the first game here tonight, the second in Moncton on Wednesday evening, back here on Friday and in Moncton on Saturday. The fifth game if necessary will be played here a week from tonight followed on Tuesday night by a contest on neutral ice, because of the ice show still in the Hub City Stadium. The game will be played either at Halifax or Amherst, the latter site preferred by the local club due to travelling expenses. The place for the game will be worked out by the two clubs and a final decision is expected shortly.

Tonight at the Forum, prizes on the hockey programs will be bigger and better than ever. Four prizes have been donated by various Charlottetown persons and firms for the program prize-winners. First prize tonight is \$10, second a Ronson lighter, third a pair of Maxine ballerina, any size and the fourth one man's shirt.
