



NEW STEEL DRAGGER UNDERGOING TRIALS

Shaw Forecasts Economic Benefits Ahead For Kings.

"When the industrial activities of this centre are in full production, the economy of Georgetown and all of Kings County should undergo unusual benefit," said Premier Walter R. Shaw who Saturday officially opens the Bathurst Marine Industries Limited shipbuilding plant in Georgetown.

Opening of the plant is the first completed phase of a two-prong development in the town which will see the building of steel trawlers combined with the processing of agricultural and sea products at the Gulf Garden Foods Limited plant which is expected to be in operation this summer.

The trawlers, the first of which is under construction in Georgetown and which will be

named officially by Mrs. Shaw, will provide sea products for processing and for combination with agricultural products. The finished goods from the frozen food plant will be sold in already-assured markets, mostly in Europe.

Premier Shaw said the Georgetown development is one of the fruits of the government's policy of encouraging new industry to locate in the province. Speaking generally on the industrial location policy, Premier Shaw said "in order to encourage industry establishment, a policy of locating favorable industrial areas has been initiated and one of these has already been located at Summerside, in which prospective industries are now under consideration and at

least one new industry has been approved.

ASSISTANCE GIVEN

"Extra assistance has been given to the Sherwood frozen food plant in order to increase its production. At New Annan a large branch of the Seaman Empire has been established to process a wide variety of farm crops. This plant, which operates almost all year around, has brought great prosperity to a wide area and is gradually extending its field of influence.

"The employment of hundreds of laborers and the influence on earnings has been material. For the first time in many years, steamer loads of island processed farm products have been shipped to the British market and the Georgetown processing plant will add greatly to our exports.

"A similar plant has been established at Montague by a British Columbia company and again valuable contacts have been made with farmers, businesses and laborers in that area.

"The Souris fish centre has also been supported while a large dairy concern at Morville has received substantial aid and is now recognized as one of the foremost and most influential dairy centres in the province.

"For Georgetown and Montague, support from the Atlantic Development Board, resulting from government representations, has been granted and will be of great assistance to industrial enterprises and to the people in the supply of power, light, sewage and good roads.

Home Construction A Vital Necessity

The greatest need in Georgetown today is housing and this problem is receiving the full attention and consideration of the Town-Council, the two industries of Bathurst Marine Ltd. and Gulf Garden Foods Ltd., the Georgetown Industrial Development Group and both the provincial and federal governments.

All realize that if Georgetown is to attain the full potential from the establishing of industries here that homes for workers will have to be provided. Certainly in this age of transportation there will always be a large number of workers commuting to work but in the best interests of efficient operations of both industries and in the essential building up of the town it is necessary that a large proportion of the workers reside in Georgetown.

Here land for home construction is available, as Georgetown has surrounding it a large area of land, which the town has made available to the government, who in turn made this land available to the industries, not only to provide for future industrial expansion but also to provide for home construction.

One area now contains six new homes and another area has been subdivided for home construction. Still another area, on the town's east side is available for the construction of low-rental housing, which is urgently needed.

Officials of the Town Council, Industries and Resources Development Group recently met with the Minister of Immigration, who is responsible to parliament for the operations of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. Earlier in the year representatives of the above groups met with and presented a brief on the housing situation to the provincial government.

SURVEY COMING

The town has made the necessary application to Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation for a survey of the situation in Georgetown and this is expected to be carried out in the near future.

The eventual installation of a municipal water and sewage system depends to a very large extent on the building of a large number of new homes from which the town would realize the tax potential to institute such a system. This system would become a part of the soon to be installed water and sewage and waste disposal system to serve Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. This system is being installed by the Atlantic Development Board and is so designed that it will provide for present and future industrial needs and also to service a population of 4,000 people.

The six new homes that have been constructed on the west side of the town, on land formerly owned by the town, are now occupied. Their location is an ideal one and provides one of the finest views in the province as one looks across the upper part of Georgetown.

Harbour and the Montague and Brudenell Rivers, to take in the beautiful countryside of Lower Montague and the historic location of what was once DeRoma's settlement on what is now known as Shar's Point. Just to the west of the new homes is located a beautiful sandy beach.

The new bungalow type homes were built for personnel of Bathurst Marine Ltd. and Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. The contractors were Town and Country and excavating for the basements was commenced in the late fall and now the homes are occupied and little remains to be done but the paving of highways and landscaping.

Should the town's efforts through Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation be successful and result in a large number of homes being constructed this would increase the population and purchasing power of the town's residents and would result in many service facilities being established in the town. They would in turn become employers with the resultant increased demand for more housing and services.
