But at the same time it was designed to give better shape to the trees and in many instances provide for more light getting into houses where heavy foliage cut off the sun.

Copper Mining Plant May Move To New Location

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Mining operations at Tilt Cove on Newfoundland's Bale Verre Peninsula may have to be moved south if the Maritime Mining Corporation doesn't find new reserves in the next two years, President M. J. Boylen of Toronto said here. "Mr. Boylen, in the province "to acquire more lands for prospecting," said there is two years of ore reserves remaining at Tilt Cove where mining has been going on since 1947. "If new reserves aren't found, and explorations haven't been "too successful," Mr. Boylen said the entire plant would be moved to Gull Bridge, 35 miles south of Tilt Cove, in a \$2,000,000 operation. The money has already been earmarked for the move, he said. The Maritime Mining will start sinking an 1,100-foot shaft at Gull Bridge, Mr. Boylen said. This would be a start on getting it ready for mining so that when the company makes its move the shutdown would only last about five
